Gateway Feature Planned Get a Sneak Peak And Provide Feedback At March 1st Meeting

Plans are underway for the neighborhood gateway feature slated for 30th and California Streets. This busy intersection marks the terminus of the neighborhood's main E-W street at Creighton University Medical Center (CUMC). The neighborhood has been working for the last year to obtain approvals from the city for the signage and finalize the design of the Gifford Park landmark. The proposed design will be presented at the general meeting on March 1. Attendees will have the opportunity at the meeting to provide feedback and suggestions for the gateway feature.

This project marks the locus of elements that are important to our community. As a pivotal resource for greater Omaha, CUMC's presence in Gifford Park is a defining feature of our identity. This project is a chance for residents of Gifford Park to define the interface between the door to CUMC and the door to the neighborhood's core at 33rd and California. With the likelihood of future development of CUMC's campus in the neighborhood, this is an interface that will continue to be refined and enriched.

The feature is also a way to share the "Grow in Gifford Park" spirit with the rest of Omaha. Complimenting our successes with the Community Garden, the Identity Garden, and tree plantings along our streets, the gateway can incorporate landscaping that showcases the talents of our community members. The generous site offers area for both perennials and annuals to lend the feature a seasonal dynamic. Lighting is another way the gateway can bring interest to the trafficked crossroads.

As a significant project for the neighborhood - currently funded at \$20,000 by Peter Kiewit Foundation, The Mayor's Grant, and Mutual of Omaha – the gateway will also set a precedent for future projects. Similar guidelines will potentially shape additional neighborhood gateway features and development within Gifford Park itself. 
Combined Sewer Overflow/Clean Solutions Omaha CSO

Hoping for a new street or sidewalk in front of your house due to combined sewer? It appears there are no sewer separation projects anticipated in Gifford Park. You're just going to have to fix that broken sidewalk yourself and GPNA is here to help! This spring we hope to collaborate with Joslyn Castle Neighborhood Association to offer residents a do-it-yourself, hands-on session on how to mix, pour, and finish a square of concrete sidewalk. The sessions will be free to residents.

Midtown Neighborhood Alliance (MNA) holds its Annual Meeting and Election of Officers (President and Secretary) on **March 21, 6:30 p.m.**, at the **Perk Avenue Café** (**1107 Park Ave**). Free Tax Help Available

The site for the annual free tax assistance is the Lay Apostolate Center at St. Cecilia's Cathedral, 40th & Webster St. Tax help will be available on Mondays from 1:00 to 3:30 p.m., Wednesdays from 6:00 to 7:30 p.m. and Saturdays from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. through the tax season, except for Wednesday, March 14, Saturday, March 17th, and Monday, March 19th. Everyone is welcome! AARP representatives will provide free tax help for our neighborhood for the 13th year in a row. Processing of basic tax returns and electronic filing will be available. No appointment is necessary; individuals will be helped on a first come, first serve basis. Please call Jackie at 551-3629 for more information.


To be able to provide assistance, persons will need to bring the following:

- 1. Valid Picture I.D.
- 2. Copies of ALL W-2, 1098, 1099 Forms and the amount of other income received by you and your spouse
- 3. Tax Identification Number (example: Social Security Number, Individual Tax Identification Number) for you, your spouse and any others shown on the tax return.
- 4. Provider's address and Tax Identification Number for Child/Dependent Care Credit
- 5. Form 8332 or copy of divorce decree for noncustodial parent claiming child
- 6. Proof of Account Number and Routing Transit Number of the financial institution for direct deposit into a savings or checking account.
- 7. Copy of prior year's tax return, if available.

Noticed any stray cats or kittens near your home or business? Their lives can be tough. Please call **553-3736**, and we can help you to help them.



Companion cats kept indoors lead safer, healthier, longer lives. If you let your cat out, the law says that she must be microchipped, or wear a collar with ID tags. Only ID can bring a lost pet home, and it helps a rescuer know that your cat has a home.

Most importantly, PLEASE SPAY AND NEUTER. Spayed/neutered pets are happier and healthier. Only spaying/neutering indoor and outdoor cats alike, humanely and effectively controls the feral cat population. Call your local vet. (For info on a low-cost spay/neuter option, call **Clarinda** at **553-3736.**)

The **Coalition for Animal Protection** (CAP) offers low-cost vaccination clinics for cats and dogs (1-yr. rabies \$5; 3-yr. rabies \$10; distemper combo \$5, and others). Also microchipping, at \$25, inclusive. They will be selling pet licenses, too, (due March 15) for one-stop shopping!

The next CAP vaccination clinics will be March 3, 1-4 p.m., at Christie Heights (37th & P); and March 10, 1-4 p.m., at Sherman Community Center (5701 N. 16th). Questions: 490-0111.

Progress Being Made At Bike Shop

Work at the Community Bicycle Shop of Omaha continues at **525 N. 33rd Street**. 
Nebraska Legislative Update

The legislative session continues to move forward as we approach the half way point. Most of the work of the Legislature during the first half of the session is done in committee. I was able to get my bill, LB 205, out of committee and sent to the full Legislature. This bill would require all Nebraska school districts to adopt antibullying policies to protect our children. Bullying has become a real problem in recent years and we need to address it head on. No longer can we simply ignore it as "kids being kids." I am very optimistic that the full Legislature will pass this much needed legislation.

The Education Committee has been very busy working on revisions to LB 1024. The Education Committee held a very informative public hearing earlier this month on several bills that have been proposed as alternatives to LB 1024. I believe the Legislature has an obligation to correct the constitutional concerns that have been raised in the lawsuits against LB 1024 this year. I believe that the break up of the Omaha Public Schools is an unconstitutional segregation of our schools and must be changed by the Legislature. I have put forth a plan that addresses all of the constitutional questions because we need to find a resolution that brings an end to the court battles. We need to once again focus on the classroom rather than the courtroom.

As always, please do not hesitate to contact me when you have a concern or want to express an opinion. It is an honor to have the privilege of representing you in the Legislature.

For Your Information . . .

The **Nebraska Humane Society** proudly provides animal control services for the City of Omaha. The Animal Control Officers work under the authority of the Chief of Police, and are allowed to issue citations for violations such as stray animals, barking dogs, dead animals, and animal bites. Investigators are authorized to write search warrants and testify in court for such crimes as animal cruelty, dangerous dogs, dog fighting, and pet shop violations. Animal Control Officers are on the road between 8 AM and midnight, with an on-call officer between midnight and 8 AM who will respond only to emergency calls from citizens, such as bats in houses, animal bites, dangerous animals, etc. Non-emergency calls are held until 8 AM.
