Green Homes: How To Green Your Trash

What is considered one of the least favorite chores of homeowners, apartment dwellers, and college students? That's right—Taking Out the Trash. It happens once a week, community-wide, people dragging out bags and cans of garbage and bins of recyclables. After a night out at the curb, the cans and bags wait patiently to be picked up by dump trucks and driven to the local landfill.

If you are a resident of Douglas County, your trash likely ends its journey at the Pheasant Point Landfill, located near Elk City, Nebraska. During 2007, the Douglas County landfill received a total of 615,000 tons of garbage. Think about it. That's equal to 1,683 Honda hybrids being dumped at the landfill every single day. And it is we, the citizens of Douglas County, generating that amount of trash. Results for surrounding communities are similar. It is estimated the average person generates 51bs of garbage every day.

Being an advocate of waste reduction in the home I have recently begun weighing my garbage. In one week I generate approximately 2.5 lbs of garbage. Compare 2.5 lbs of garbage in a week to 5 lbs of garbage in a day.

It is possible to reduce your waste. Not only is it possible, but it can be easy and fun too. And, it's pretty popular as well. Take for instance the recently launched Waste Diet website. Go to <u>www.thewastediet.com</u> and take the waste diet challenge and figure out 1) how much waste you generate in a month and 2) how to challenge yourself and your family to reduce your waste.

To get started, here are a few tips for reducing waste around your home.

- Save money and reduce landfill waste by eliminating disposable tissues from your home. An environmentally friendly alternative to facial tissues is handkerchiefs. You can even make your own by hemming squares of fabric from unused table linens and/or t-shirts. Just throw them in the washer with your dish towels.
- Speaking of dish towels, choose tea towels or dish towels over disposable paper towels. This will save you money and eliminate a portion of the waste stream.
- A variety of beauty and cleaning products are now available in dispensers that you purchase just once and then refill from flexible pouches. You can reduce packaging waste by as much as 80% when you buy shampoo, hand soap, lotions and detergents in this way.
- Reusable and/or canvas bags can be kept with you and used for all your shopping needs, not just at the grocery store.
- Remember, if you reduce what you bring into your home you automatically reduce what will go out to the curb!

Last Call For Free Tax Help

The site for the annual free tax assistance is the Lay Apostolate Center at St. Cecilia's Cathedral, 40th & Webster St. Tax help will be available on Mondays from 1:00 to 3:30 p.m. and Wednesdays from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. now through the tax season (April 15). Everyone is welcome!

AARP representatives will provide free tax help for our neighborhood for the 14th year in a row. Processing of basic tax returns and electronic filing will be available. No appointment is necessary; individuals will be helped on a first come, first serve basis. Please call **Jackie** at **551-3629** for more information.

To be able to provide assistance, persons will need to bring the following:

- 1. Valid Picture I.D.
- 2. Copies of ALL W-2, 1098, 1099 Forms and the amount of other income received by you and your spouse
- 3. Tax Identification Number (example: Social Security Number, Individual Tax Identification Number) for you, your spouse and any others shown on the tax return.
- 4. Provider's address and Tax Identification Number for Child/Dependent Care Credit
- 5. Form 8332 or copy of divorce decree for non-custodial parent claiming child
- 6. Proof of Account Number and Routing Transit Number of the financial institution for direct deposit into a savings or checking account.
- 7. Copy of prior year's tax return, if available.

coffee roasting, especially the odors, smoke and large amounts of steam that are emitted from the roasting chimney and that are often mistaken for a building fire. In fact, some of our neighbors have called the fire department recently, and while we are grateful for the concern we hope to eliminate the false alarms and not trouble the fire department again. During the roasting process, brief bursts of smoke, coffee odor, and primarily steam eminate from the chimney. When the air outside is chilly and/or humid, the steam doesn't rise quickly and simply hangs around the roof near the chimney. Anyone who didn't know what was going on and wasn't used to the smell of roasting coffee could easily mistake the roasting odor and the steam for evidence of a building fire, but we hope everyone in the neighborhood now knows that this is not the case. We will try to keep our roasting scheduled for late evenings, after dark, to do as little as possible to raise concern. We love the neighborhood, we're happy to be here, and we look forward to opening up a coffee shop as soon as possible. Thanks again! Blue Line Coffee
