I want to encourage everyone who is interested in learning how to speak in front of city councils, judges, zoning boards, liquor commissions, etc. to attend the **Block of Builders Workshop** at the **Neighborhood Center for Greater Omaha** (115 S. 49th St.), on May 1st from 5:30 to 7:00 p.m. A'Jamal Byndon, who has over 23 years of effective advocacy and work in the social justice area, will lead a discussion on how to write effective letters and other means to gather support on issues for change and improvement. Block of Builder sessions are designed to help neighborhood residents and citizens get the information they need to preserve and improve your community. If you are interested in attending but cannot make it, let Ron know.

Over the past months we solicited grant ideas at general membership meetings and executive board meetings. Here are suggestions to date: dusk-to dawn lighting in the business district, re-roof park shelter, historic lighting (\$4,000 each), youth garden, more flower pots for the business district, water hydrant at 33rd & Cass for watering DM Identity Garden, re-seeding baseball/soccer fields in the park, paint supplies for painting playground equipment in lower park and more Gateway features. And the winner is – dusk to dawn lighting (\$600.00/yr) – which we proceeded to request during this year's Mayor's Neighborhood Improvement Grant. We'll know whether we were awarded the grant next month. If you have ideas for next year or are interested in writing a grant yourself, contact **Cynthia 556-2090** or **Chris 342-6006**.



What's New, Pussycat?

The City Council is deliberating a longawaited ordinance to legalize TNR (Trap-Neuter-Release), the most humane and effective way to control feral cat



populations, while supporting their health and well-being, and reducing the number of cats destroyed in shelters. Feral cats are humanely trapped, sterilized, vaccinated, released, and fed by a caretaker. Homes are found for homeable kittens and adults. A stable colony of ferals results, called a "managed colony." TNR has been successful in communities around the world—including Gifford Park! Basically, the ordinance will make it legal for anyone to practice TNR, with a permit.

An antiquated law makes it illegal to feed stray cats, but **The Nebraska Humane Society** now actively promotes TNR. To read about the new ordinance online, go to the Omaha City Council website and click on the agenda for April 17, item 67 on the docket. Concerns about technical aspects of the ordinance have been raised, but The Humane Society has been reassuring, stating that they are there to help, not hinder, and that apparently complex protocols and application procedures will cause colony caretakers no difficulty in practice. And there was good news: TNR will be legal on public land, as well as on private and commercial property. Refining of the ordinance continues.

A recent newspaper article about the ordinance caused misunderstanding and confusion, according to **Judy Varner** of the Humane Society, who explained that the intention is to legalize responsible feeding by caring individuals, not to outlaw or criminalize it. Speakers at the April 24th hearing corrected myths about feral cats. A feral cat, like other urban wildlife (squirrels, rabbits, deer), will flee from you. You will not get close enough to touch a feral, or to be scratched or harmed by one in any way. Also, there is no evidence that ferals pose any public health risk.

Generation NExT.net Youth Program
