Youth Garden Program In Full Bloom

June has been a very busy month at the Garden! One look as you pass by confirms that the children of Gifford Park have been actively engaged. The following is a brief summary of what we have done the past 5 Saturdays in June and what we are planning for July and August. As always, thanks for the endless support from the friends of the Youth Garden. Here's a sample of our activities:

On June 2^{nd} , Week 3 of the program, we planted our individual plots with seeds and seedlings either with parental or volunteer supervision. Thanks to **Indian** Creek Nursery and City Sprouts for donating numerous tomato, broccoli, and pepper plants. We loved planting every single one, and they are really growing! Also, we sowed pans of annual rye grass in preparation for the Week 4 take-home project. Each week includes tending to our plots by pulling weeds and watering, and June 9th was no different. **Kate Bodmann** helped us start weeding and planting the gourd tunnel, while Sarah Newman, our bird expert, led the cleaning, filling, and construction of a variety of bird feeders. We brought back our pans of grass to create fantasy play gardens from miniature toys, treasures, and natural materials, too.

Week 5, June 16th, seemed to be one of the hottest, busiest, yet most productive of the season. We landscaped the side yard, moved OmaGro, and completed the planting of the gourds and vines, as well as the remaining donated vegetable plants in the shared youth plots. **Dana Carlton-Flint** earned special thanks for donating supplies, expertise, and time in helping nearly every adult and child present make at least one boutonniere for our Father's Day project. They were absolutely handsome! Additionally, thanks to **Diane Kaye** for providing lots and lots of beautiful flowers from her yard for the activity.

Have you seen who's been hanging around the Garden? During *Week 6*, June 23rd, adults and children alike donated clothing, shoes, and accessories and collaborated to create numerous scarecrows. (Do you know how many there are? Let Dana know for a special prize.) Drop by and see what we

What's New, Pussycat?

Kitten season is here. Kittens are born year-round. But between March and November, a kitten population explosion far exceeds available homes.



How can you help, if you notice a pregnant or nursing mother cat? Please feed her with moistened "kitten chow," and provide plenty of water. If you can trap the mother pregnant, to give birth indoors, that's best. If the kittens are born outside, when they are old enough to walk, they'll follow Mama, and you can see how many kittens there are. The Nebraska Humane Society (NHS) says, don't separate outdoor kittens from their mother before six weeks of age, for the best chance of survival. (8 weeks if possible for indoor births.) Unless you know that you can catch the mother and all the kittens at once, wait to trap them until six weeks of age—except in an emergency, if they have lost their mother. Then, humanely trap the whole family, spay Mama, vaccinate and de-worm the kittens, and do your best to find loving homes for all. (Feline Friendz, 778-1111 feline friendz@yahoo.com; Coalition for Animal Protection, 490-0111; Gifford Park Cats, 553-3736; or your veterinarian can advise you at every step, especially if you are raising unweaned kittens who have lost their mother.) The younger the kittens, the easier to tame. If Mama is too wild to remain an indoor cat, you can re-release her and feed her as an outdoor cat after spaying, vaccinating, and ear-tipping. 90% of feral kittens are tameable and homeable as indoor cats. The others, when old enough to spay/neuter, may also be released and fed as outdoor cats.

Unfortunately, the optimism of early spring at the NHS—the hope that this year's kittens would not exceed capacity—was premature. All area shelters have more cats and kittens than they can cope with. Please do not surrender feral cats or kittens to The Humane Society, as they would be destroyed at this time. Please secure assurances for the safety and future even of TAME cats or kittens before surrendering them to any shelter at this time.

When seeking homes for kittens—or dogs or cats—never post "free to good home" ads. Instead, always require a donation—perhaps \$25. (If you wish, you can use it to help other animals or donate it to an animal welfare group.) The reason? "Bunchers" scour classified ads and bulletin boards for "free" animals, pretend to adopt them, and instead sell them to laboratories to be experimented on—often through "grade B dealers" as middlemen. (Pets may be stolen from backyards for the same purpose.) Typically a buncher will not pay money for an animal; asking a

donation therefore helps weed them out. The solution to the kitten population explosion? As always, spay/neuter; don't let an unfixed animal roam; and never abandon a pet. (It's cruel and illegal.) Many kittens can't make it without our help. Predators, mothers too depleted to nurture, parasites, starvation, and harsh weather all threaten. But with our help, kittens born feral can make the most affectionate, playful, joyous pets and enjoy the happy lives they deserve.

I'd like to share a few thoughts about our neighborhood's current challenges and opportunities, in case the position interests you. First, I do think there is someone out there (among our roughly 5,000 residents within our GPNA boundaries – Dodge to Cuming, 27th to 37th) who is right for the position, even if the timing is not perfect. As past president and knowing other past leadership, I'll be the first to say it can be demanding and even overwhelming at times in a neighborhood like ours with our diversity (ethnic, cultural, housing stock, socio-economic, age, profession/student, etc.), challenges with some of our city services, social issues, public safety problems, economic development and involvement in our business district, annual events/activities, current projects, new projects, time commitment from volunteers, shortage of new leadership, and other challenges. Having said this, I think GPNA since the beginning has maintained a great reputation for being committed to preserving and improving our neighborhood, while promoting a real sense of community. For anyone thinking of being GPNA President, we have always faced the above problems (many worse than today) - just ask any of our previous leadership.

Those are the challenges; how about opportunities? Here's a partial list: working with new Northeast Precinct Police Captain Dave Baker, Mutual of Omaha Development (Midtown Crossing), slow but steady improvement in our business district, Community Bike Shop, community garden and other annual activities, tree planting, neighborhood arboretum plan and other green master plan projects, Gateway Feature at 30th & California, a great GPNA newsletter and website providing more exposure of our neighborhood's attributes to the right people, families, businesses and even investors, Yates School opportunities, great young leaders like **Cynthia Shuck, Stuart Shell, Dana Freeman, Emerick Huber, Jill Westfall, Daniel Lawse**...and other "diamonds in the rough" ready to surface.

Ultimately the GPNA President's position can be anything you want it to be. Every one of the past presidents had their own way of leading – and all did a great job and we appreciate their tremendous efforts! The following homes will be included on the tour: 1624 So. 32nd Ave. (1896 Dutch Colonial), 1513 So. 33rd St. (1918 Arts & Crafts), 1140 Turner Blvd. (1910 Arts & Crafts), 3541 Woolworth Ave. (1913 Four Square), 1330 So. 35th St. (1907 Colonial Revival), 1130 Turner Blvd. (1908 Tudor Revival), 1136 So. 35th Ave. (1905 Arts & Crafts), and 1310 So. 35th Ave. (1906 Four Square). Three gardens will be on the tour as well: 3302 and 3335 Woolworth Ave. and 1119 So. 36th St.
