## Landmarks Tour Set For Oct. 19

Plans for **Restore Omaha** activities for 2008-2009 are well underway. Now in its fourth year, Restore Omaha, with **Metropolitan Community College Foundation**, offers current and potential owners of older properties an opportunity to learn from local and regional experts about how to restore, revive and preserve their home or business.

The **Historic Restoration Tour** organized by Landmarks, Inc. kicks off the year with a tour on **Sunday, October 19, from 1:00 – 5:00 pm**. According to **Jennifer Honebrink** with Landmarks, Inc, "Restoration tours are a great way to learn the difference between remodeling, restoration, and preservation. Many still believe that newer is better. We aim to show people how older can be better yet."

This year Landmarks, Inc. chose to focus on North Omaha because of its rich history. It has been the site of Fort Omaha, the Trans-Mississippi Exposition, some of Omaha's earliest homes and apartments and was in the path of the 1913 tornado. Over time, the area developed a wide variety of housing styles from Queen Anne and Spanish Colonial Revival to Bungalows and 1950s Ranch homes. Today it is a wonderful architectural treasure. **Dave Lawrence**, from the Miller Park-Minne-Lusa Neighborhood **Association**, owns a home in the area. He stated. "The area is one of Omaha's best kept secrets. The neighborhoods have a vast inventory of architecturally significant properties for those interested in restoration and preservation and the location is convenient to downtown Omaha, the airport and services."

Landmarks, Inc. and the Miller Park-Minne Lusa Neighborhood Association are proud to showcase historic homes and businesses within the Miller Park-Minne Lusa neighborhoods at the October 19 Home Restoration Tour. Seven properties will be open for tours as well as several other unique neighborhood sites highlighted for the "windshield" tour. Honebrink added, "This tour will be uniquely guided by the homeowners themselves. Most of them are not in the construction industry, but are simply people with a passion for preservation. #### **Grant Update**

Thanks to everyone who has put hours of time and energy into the **GPNA Gateway Feature** project. As many of you know our neighborhood received \$5,000 from **Mutual of Omaha**, \$5,000 from the **Mayor of Omaha**, and a matching grant of \$10,000 from the **Peter Kewit Company** to build a gateway into our neighborhood in 2004/2005. Many attempts were made to complete this project by numerous members but road blocks hit us at every turn, each requiring more time to overcome. As we continued to work towards the goal we were informed by Kiewit that they were withdrawing the matching grant due to the project taking so long to materialize. The Mayor's grant and the Mutual grant are still available for our use. I am asking for members to submit ideas for projects that cost under \$10,000, will improve our neighborhood, can be completed by June 1, 2009, and are built/completed on city property. These will be put before the Executive Board; three ideas will be selected and brought to the membership for a vote. 



#### **Browning A Little Of Your Green Life**

Composting. I did this throughout most of my childhood and early teenage years without every realizing I was "composting". To me I was throwing away scraps and piling all our yard waste into one area so that we didn't have to bag it and haul it out to the curb to get picked up. On top of that, we were able to put what came out the bottom of our pile into our garden and flowerbeds and not have to spend lots of time and money on fertilizers. This was just how we did things; it wasn't to make the garbage man's job easier, make the landfills less crowded, or be as "green" as possible. It just made sense, because with as little effort as we put into it, we received huge returns on it.

Simply stated, composting is the decomposition of organic matter. It is a pretty straight forward process and project that you can undertake to reduce your environmental impact. When getting started with implementing a composting program of your own, follow some basic steps to help organize yourself and make the most of your resources.

1. Where you live makes a pretty big impact on what style of composting you can do. There are two types of composting that we can look at, "normal" composting and vermicomposting.

- "Normal" composting is what most people are familiar with, and includes grass clippings, leaves, food scraps, etc. Normal composting is perfect for those with larger yards and who have yard waste and food scraps to compost.
- Vermicomposting utilizes a bin (sizes and material it is made of can vary) and "red worms" which speed up decomposition of food scraps. These "red worms" and bins don't take up a lot of room, so they can be placed almost anywhere and are perfect for those with small homes or apartments.

2. After you decide what type of composting you are going to use, now it's time to look at the structure you want to use to compost.

- **Heaps** are as the name implies a large heap of yard waste and scraps. It is important to realize that this can attract animals and insects if food scraps are not mixed in and covered when placed into the heap. This will help keep pests away and speed up the process.
- **Hoops** are more structured than a heap. You can utilize fencing or chicken wire, or buy a pre-made plastic enclosure. This helps keep your compost pile contained and can be fitted with a door towards the bottom to make getting at the compost itself easy to harvest. This setup can be easily moved around the yard as needed and can provide a certain level of protection from animals, even though most hoops typically are not animal-proof.
- **Rollers** or tumblers are manufactured containers that help aid in mixing and speeding up the decomposition. These systems are typically more expensive than other composting bins, but they are fairly compact in size, so they would be great in a small yard.
- Worm bins are used for vermicomposting. Using a plastic storage bin is great for a worm bin as it will last for a long time, keeps rodents out, and with the lid on, it keeps things dark for the worms.

3. Now that you've made it this far, what should you put into your new compost pile? There are four major components to compost bins that you want ensure you have.

- Green material This includes new grass clippings, pruned plants, and kitchen scraps. These materials are high in nitrogen, so when they start the decomposition process, they release heat, which in turn helps keep the process going. Before putting this material into the pile, make sure you can get it as chopped up as possible; this will help to speed up the process.
- Brown material This is leaves you rake up in the fall time, dried out shrub prunnings and weeds. Just as with the green material, chop up the browns as much as possible to help speed things along.
- Air We've talked about mixing up our compost piles here, and this is the reason why. The process needs good air flow for oxygen to work its magic on the materials and the microorganisms that feed on this material need air as well to keep it going.
- Water The compost bid shouldn't be soaking wet, but a damp rag consistency is ideal for the bin.

Composting is a great way to brown your green life up a little bit. Growing up, this was just how life was. I had lots of fun throwing stale bread with my sister into the pile and see who could get the most pieces inside the bin. Bottom line, have fun with it and reap the rewards from it.
