Safety Lighting Update

Darryl Hutton, Jim Wilwerding, and Dana Carlton-Flint met with OPPD to finalize 8 locations for additional lighting in dark alleys and in our park. Those locations have been signed off on and will be hooked up in the next 30 days. This additional lighting has been made possible by an anonymous donor. These 8 locations will be funded for the next 4 years.

OPPD is also going to do a lighting assessment of 33rd Street to determine if there is adequate lighting provided by the city for that area. After the assessment is made it will be decided whether the city or our safety lighting grant will fund additional lighting to that area.

New Business Opens Door

Discount Laundry has come to the Gifford Park business district. Discount Laundry has five stores in the Omaha area, including the newest store at 33rd and California. The Maytag-equipped store opened in the beginning of July and includes washers that handle up to six loads, 7 1/2 load dryers, and everything in between. The owners, Todd and Toni Santoro, said that customers of the former laundromat were polled as to what improvements they would like to see in the new store. In response to their requests, Todd stated that all brand new equipment has been installed and a new roof added to the building. The laundry will feature fair prices with weekly specials, air conditioning, flat screen TVs, video games, vending machines, and free wifi. According to Todd, his goal is to have the nicest laundry in the area for the people in this neighborhood. Also, as the business grows, he wants to provide a few jobs for people in the neighborhood. Right now there is one person employed part time, but as the store gets busier and drop-off laundry and commercial accounts increase, he wants to add more employees. Todd said that there has been a great mix of customers so far, and he tries to make sure all the signs are in English and Spanish. He anticipates having a variety of customers; neighborhood residents, Creighton students, Dundee & Gold Coast residents, and others. With the neighborhood's diversity, he is hoping that the laundry might in some way help people learn something about each other. "I watched a Spanish woman helping a Sudanese woman understand the new equipment," Todd explained, "neither spoke the other's language, but they worked together to figure it out. There is nothing more basic to every culture than keeping clean, including our clothes, and helping someone else, and both happened here. We also hope we can continue in the tradition of California Taco and the California Bar in helping the neighborhood grow."

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Control Plan Available For Public Comment

On July 2nd, the City of Omaha made the final draft of the Long Term Control Plan for the Omaha Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO) Control Program available for public comment. Written comments are requested to be submitted by Wednesday, August 5, 2009. A public meeting regarding the Long Term Control Plan will be held at the Omaha Public Schools TAC Building, 3215 Cuming Street, on Tuesday, August 18th, 2009, from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m.

The draft report is also available to download from the City's CSO website (www.OmahaCSO.com). Hard copies of the draft report will be available at all Omaha Public Library locations, the Omaha Public Works Department, 1819 Farnam Street Suite 600, the Neighborhood Center, 115 South 49th Street, the Greater Omaha Chamber of Commerce offices downtown, 1301 Harney Street and the west office, 13206 Grover Street, early next week.

The draft report summarizes the results of a threeyear planning process by the City, Program Management team, and more than 40 engineering firms. During that time, more than 100 individuals participated on advisory panels to provide ongoing feedback and suggestions to the City to determine the most cost effective ways to control overflows of raw sewage into the Missouri River and Papillion Creek and to provide community benefits beyond clean water. The estimated capital cost of this unfunded federal mandate is \$1.63 billion in 2009 dollars. Construction must be complete by 2024. 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Youth Garden Fun Continues

Young gardeners, their families, and volunteers have continued gathering each Saturday morning from 10 to 11:30 AM at Gifford Park Community Garden for more Youth Garden fun. During Week 3's "P Is for Permaculture" lesson on June 6, **Trilety Wade** shared her growing knowledge of basic permaculture principles and keyhole garden design. She encouraged children to use the best tools at their disposal—their eyes. Seeing the present and possible interactions within nature and/or humans in the garden can help us determine best gardening practices. Everyone had a chance to get dirty making seed balls of compressed clay, compost, flower & vegetable seeds, and water. These little "bombs" have everything they need to grow and can be dropped or tossed onto any otherwise inhospitable landscape in need of beautification. Watch out for guerrilla gardeners in your midst!

On June 13, we were busy constructing and planting our "<u>Tepees, Tunnels, and Trellises</u>." Some gardeners lined our two tunnels with a mix of birdhouse and snake gourds while others trellised and planted purple hyacinth beans and love-in-a-puff seeds. Still, others dug big holes in order to plant our canna and elephant ear bulbs and some sowed broomcorn. Stop by and see how our hard work is paying off in vining, twining, and towering beauties. We also planted three rows, or fifteen of our Youth Garden boxes, with vegetable crops that will be harvested and given to Omaha Food Bank, Salvation Army Food Pantry, and Gifford Park neighbors in need. We recognize that many Omahans do not have access to healthy, fresh vegetables, and we are in a position to share with them from our abundant garden. Finally, everyone made a <u>topsy-turvey upside-down tomato container</u> from a green 2-liter bottle to take home. Thanks to **Holly Israel** for sharing that lesson idea with us.

Community gardeners **Brandon & Melissa Geary** are sharing their musical talent at the garden this summer. Brandon & Melissa are in a band called Honeybee and have tutored youth gardeners on several occasions after the program. The children are learning lyrics to a Honeybee song, accompanied by Brandon on accordion and Melissa on guitar. Look for us at a concert venue near you!

On Week 5, June 20, we had an opportunity to lash together, decorate, and plant our bean tepee since we ran out of time the week before, in addition to enjoying a "<u>Hands on Herps</u>" session. Herpetologist **Pam Cheever** from University of Nebraska Extension in Douglas & Sarpy Counties and her husband brought a reptilian sample to the garden for a fun and informative morning. Everyone got to touch a variety of snakes, lizards, and turtles while simultaneously learning factoids about our ectothermic friends.

We had a fantastic time with our photo-famous "These Boots Are Made for Planting" project on June 27. Everyone selected an old boot, shoe, hat, or glove to reuse as a planter for brightly colored annual flowers. In addition, we kicked off our poem memorization contest that will continue through the end of the program. Children can find numerous poems about plants, bugs, and birds posted throughout the garden or bring one from home to recite for a prize. (Our gardeners who have yet to learn to read are able to participate by singing a song or rehearsing a short rhyme.)

Everyone has a weekly opportunity to present one poem after restating any poem recited the previous week, thus better ensuring recall. Thanks to **Joy Doll, Sandy Freeman, Laurie Smith Camp**, and **Tiare Weak** for donating books, kid-sized gardening tools, and other goodies for prizes. They disappear like hot cakes weekly! Later, **Jamie Grayson-Berglund** & her Destination Midtown crew brought balloons, stickers, and ice cream for a neighborhood party to celebrate the <u>Spirit of Midtown</u> award. Destination Midtown is an unprecedented collaborative community development effort working to raise the quality of life and return Midtown to prominence. Dana Freeman & Gifford Park Youth Garden were presented with 2009's second quarter award. The honor has brought a wealth of positive, local media attention to Gifford Park Community Garden and its programs, and we sincerely thank Destination Midtown for the recognition.

Youth gardeners welcomed Independence Day Week 7 by preparing "<u>Hot Tamales</u>!" We celebrated summer's arrival with a cooking project. Everyone had a chance to assemble tamales to be cooked on a campstove. Thanks to **Mary Bamesberger** and **Don Freeman** for letting us borrow your Colemans. There was plenty of time before and after lunch to relax and have fun by playing with water pistols and catching bugs and butterflies. We had a wonderful holiday!

Gourd artist and Youth Garden grandparent and volunteer **Tami Rand** shared her unique talent and love of gourds with adults and children alike on July 11. Week 8's "Gourd Musical Instruments" was a big hit! Everyone had a chance to select and fill a Gifford Park Community Garden-grown gourd with dried rice and beans to create shakers. The instruments were absolutely stunning after decorating with paint and beads. We had a chance to use our shakers following our lesson when we again practiced our Honeybee song with Brandon & Melissa. There are many musicians in the garden.

Open House For Melrose Apartment Building

There will be an open house for neighborhood residents to tour the Melrose Apartments Saturday, August 1, from 11 a.m to 1 p.m. Gerry Reimer, Scott Semrad, and their development team are currently renting the recently rehabilitated historic building on the northwest corner of 33rd & California St. The Melrose Apartment building was constructed in 1916 and was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1989. The building was completed during Omaha's first apartment "boom" period from 1912 to 1917. The original architects were H.D Frankfurt and Alex Beck. Two separate three-story buildings are positioned adjacent to each other in an L-shape with a large courtyard between the buildings. Both buildings are made of brown brick with identical limestone and darker brown brick detailing, with the west building being larger than the north one. There are balconies flanking each building's entryway with "The Melrose" inscribed above. Come check out the apartments; Gerry, Scott and their team have done a GREAT job with the building and landscaping.

Betty was recognized as our GPNA "Neighbor of the Year'" a few years ago for her many years of volunteering. Betty said she will always remember the great times she and Greg had taking a trip to South Dakota a few weeks before Greg's passing; seeing Mt. Rushmore and the Black Hills was something they really wanted to do. Our thoughts and prayers are with the Slayden family.

Have you noticed the "Identity Garden" blooming in Gifford Park near 33rd & Cass Street? Volunteers **Cynthia Shuck, John Barna,** and **Roger & Sandy Freeman** helped to plant, mulch, water, weed and maintain the 15 ft diameter flower garden, which has a nice cobblestone border. There is an iron sign and lamp post installed in the middle. Many thanks to **Destination Midtown** for donating \$300 for the plants. The purpose of these gardens is to "identify" the dozen neighborhoods within the Destination Midtown boundary with acommon link.

Whenever special neighbors move out of our neighborhood, it's never the same. This is the case with my next door neighbors of 12 years, Eric & Annemarie Noll and their children Preston and Lucas. The Nolls were simply the best neighbors anyone could have. They were active members of the GPNA; they volunteered with some of our events and activities, and supported and participated in fighting more off-sale alcohol outlets in our neighborhood (including testifying in Lincoln before the Liquor Control Commission). Eric & Annemarie's attitude and commitment to a safe neighborhood was unwavering. I witnessed this on many occasions when serious problems arose around our immediate area; they would confront the issue (and badbehaving people) head on - not everyone has the guts to take this direct approach, but their actions (along with help from other good neighbors) set the tone for a safer neighborhood that we experience today. Sallie and I will always be especially grateful for their vision and dedication to the community garden at 35th & Cass (directly behind their old home). I could write much more about these efforts, but I will simply say the community garden would not be anything like it is today without the Noll's vision, dedication and hard work - they were one of the "founding fathers". They will always be a big part of the garden and the neighborhood, and we look forward to seeing them at future garden and GPNA events, and wish them well in their new home in Omaha (not too far away). by Chris Foster
