Neighborhood Survey Ready To Hit The Street

At our next neighborhood meeting on May 13th at Creighton University Medical Center, the Gifford Park Neighborhood Association along with Destination Midtown will be kicking off a summer long effort to implement a neighborhood wide survey to get feedback from the residents, renters, business owners, neighboring institutions, and neighborhood visitors. This survey is the result of a handful of meetings conducted over the past year with Destination Midtown and various Gifford Park residents and volunteers. It is from these meetings a survey was created and a summer long game plan developed. The goal is to complete the surveying by August in-order to compile the data and by late fall begin the process of looking at the future of the neighborhood based on this information.

Getting your feedback is very important to us so please fill out a survey when you have a chance. The future direction of our neighborhood will depend on what you tell us.

Home Repair Help from Habitat for Humanity

In 2009, Habitat for Humanity of Omaha introduced the Roof and Repair program, an exciting new initiative that helps existing home owners maintain their property.

The Roof and Repair program offers a no-interest loan to current home owners for exterior repair projects. Along with the loan, Habitat also facilitates competitive bidding from reliable local contractors, to ensure that home owners receive a fair price and responsible, high-quality work.

The program is intended for individuals who make 80% of area median income (AMI) or less. Area median income is a measure of household income and scales according to the number of people in the household. 80% of AMI for a family of four, for instance, is \$53,680. There is no age requirement for home owners, and the program can be especially helpful to retired persons.

This year, Habitat hopes to expand its new program by 50% and is searching out home owners that could benefit from the program. Hábitat para Humanidad Ayuda con Reparaciones de Hogares

En el 2009, Hábitat para Humanidad de Omaha introdujo el programa de Reparaciones de Techos, una iniciativa excitante que ayuda dueños de hogares mantener sus propiedades.

El programa de Reparaciones de Techos ofrece préstamos donde no se cobra interés para reparaciones al exterior de hogares a los dueños de esos hogares. A demás del préstamo, Hábitat también facilita la puja competitiva de contratistas locales confiables, para asegurar que los dueños de hogares reciben un precio justo y trabajo de calidad responsable.

El intento del programa es para ayudar a individuos que ganan 80% o menos del sueldo mediano del área (AMI). *Area Medium Income* (AMI) *Sueldo Mediano del Área* es una medida del sueldo en el hogar y se mide de acuerdo con el número de personas viviendo en el hogar. 80% del AMI para una familia de cuatro personas, por ejemplo, es \$53,680. No hay requisitos de edad para calificar en el programa, y puede ser de ayuda especial para personas jubiladas.

Este año, Hábitat espera crecer este nuevo programa más de 50% y busca dueños de hogares que pueden beneficiar de este programa. Gifford Park Community Garden Looks Forward To Planting Season

By the time that this article has been published our annual garden clean-up will be just a memory. This upcoming Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to noon, the call has gone out to all Community Gardeners to spruce and wake up the garden for our opening on May 8th. **Chris Foster** has tilled the plots that were approved for this, and many eager gardeners have already started cold crop items such as lettuce, onions, and garlic. We are so excited at the garden as just recently we received three outstanding awards. We were just notified this past weekend that our application for the Mayor's grant for \$5,000 was approved; therefore, look for new and exciting additions at the garden. We also received notification that we were approved for the Green America grant for \$1,000. The Green America grant is for plants, and we are selecting wonderful additions for our permanent beds as well as developing other areas of our space. The third gift is near and dear to me. Star Roses in Texas awarded Gifford Park Community Garden 45 new roses. I just picked up this delivery, which was housed until they were ready at Papio Valley Nursery.

The Gifford Park Community Board and I are working on the perfect spot for development of a new rose bed. Under direction from Destination Midtown, we have changed the vision of our Identity Garden at the corner of 33rd and Cass to being more perennial-based. If you haven't gotten a chance to view the new permanent additions of peony, salvia, baptista, and iris to this bed, please check out the fabulous work that Sandv Freeman has accomplished. Bob Hutton has gotten the water turned on so that Sandy can water and maintain this bed. Al Moellenbeck cut and donated 200 wood garden stakes. The new roses most likely will go into our park close to this updated Identity Garden to be closer to water as roses adore 2 to 3 inches of water weekly during their growing season. All of the roses that we were gifted are hardy shrub roses which once established need very little care and tending.

This past weekend, I was notified of a random gorilla gardening event. One of our new additions to the neighborhood, **Ty Osborne**, crafted a new flower bed in our park in an area which had never been tended before. Please stop by and visit us at our opening on May 8th. Please check out our newly graded baseball field in the park. Please enjoy our newly tended beds. Look for new additions to our garden, and please stop by.

The program offers a wide variety of recreation activities to children ages 6-15 and it's all free! With neighborhood sites throughout the city, Playground Leaders create a fun-filled environment with activities including sports, games, arts and crafts and nature activities.

Once again, Gifford Park will be a full-time site. The program begins Monday, June 14th, and ends Thursday, Aug 5th. Normal hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 10:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. Pre-registration is not required; parents need to register at the site on the child's first day. The Summer Sun Dawg Playground Program is designed to provide activities for children and is not a substitute for day camp or childcare.

There is always something going on at a Summer Sun Dawg Playground sites; it may be a hot game of box hockey or a cool water balloon fight. In addition to the activities that happen everyday, the Summer Sun Dawg Playground Program enjoys a rich tradition of annual special events including Omaha Royals baseball game, roller skating, bowling, and the ever popular Henry Doorly Zoo.

The Summer Sun Dawg Playground Program offers even more than a fun time; it fosters self-esteem and friendships and provides participants with positive and caring role models. 
