Holiday Spirit Abounds In Gifford Park Neighborhood



Poinsettias - The Plants Of Christmas

OK....what's red, purple, pink, white, and bi-colored? Give up? Think hard....it's December. What would most individuals have in their houses plant-wise for the holiday season?

Poinsettia is the answer. I know you knew that. In fact, I am sure that you are getting ready on December 12th for National Poinsettia Day, which was established by an Act of Congress to commemorate Joel Poinsett and the plant that has become symbolic with Christmas.

Joel Poinsett was really the first of three people responsible for this plant's popularity. Joel was the Ambassador to Mexico from 1825 to 1829. Joel also founded the Smithsonian Institution. It turns out that Joel Roberts Poinsett was an avid botanist, and sent plants from Mexico to his own greenhouses in South Carolina. From there he propagated the plants, sending them to friends and relatives. The second person responsible for promoting the poinsettia actually was one of the recipients of Joel's plants. Colonel Robert Carr introduced the poinsettia at an exhibition of the Pennsylvania Horticulture Society. Colonel Carr was the owner of a very famous nursery in Philadelphia. From there Colonel Carr promoted this plant not only in the U.S. but introduced this "seasonal plant" into Europe. This plant was shipped around the country during the 1800's, more as an outdoor plant for warm climates. Around 1920, in southern California, a horticulturist named Paul Ecke became the third person to promote this plant. Paul thought that this shrub growing wild along roadsides in California would make a perfect Christmas flower, so he set about cultivating whole fields of this flower in what is

Poinsettias were originally cultivated by the Aztecs in Mexico, and this plant is native to an area called Taxo del Alarcon in southern Mexico. In its native area, it grows to about 10 feet high and is considered a woody shrub. It blooms during the shorter days of winter, and because of its brilliant color, the flower is considered a symbol of purity. The Aztecs used this plant not only for decoration, but for practical uses. They made a purplish dye from the "bracts" (the colored stuff that we think of as the flowers), and used the milky sap to treat fevers.

Lastly, this plant is a member of the spurge family, Euphorbiaceae, and was first marketed as Euphorbia poinsettia. A German taxonomist named it Euphorbia pulcherrima (most beautiful) in 1833, and this remains the correct scientific name for this plant. The common name that we use today is believed to have been "coined" around 1836.

So enjoy December 12th, and have a joyous holiday with friends and family.

CBPO Update

Probably like most of the rest of the neighborhood, the Community Bike Project has been busy getting ready for winter and thinking about when warmer weather returns! With help from one of our board members, as well as the Habitat for Humanity ReStore, we've replaced several of our old, leaky windows with much better, new, efficient ones, and we've installed a new basement door to help keep out the draft. James came by and fixed up our front window sill, too, which had certainly seen better days. Thanks to James Hermsen, Randall Smith, Ananth Kalyan, and Andrew Camp for all your help! Hopefully, we'll use a bit less energy and be a bit more environmentally (and economically) efficient this cold season. Operationally, we continue to hold our winter Open Shop hours on Saturdays from noon-4pm. We've been pretty lucky with the weather so far, so it's still a great time to stop by with your bike to get a quick tune up or to learn about fixing that nagging brake that squeals every time you ride. Or just come in to say hi, too. Our bike mechanics classes are continuing, too, every other Tuesday night at 6 pm. Our next class is this Tuesday, Dec. 7th, and the topic is "Hubs & Quick Releases!" We ask everyone for a \$10 donation to attend the class, so that we can give our teachers—who are experience bike mechanics from bike stores around town—a little something for their time, but if that's a problem, just let us know and we'll probably work something out. On Sunday the 5th, we're helping out the Omaha Police Department with their event "Santa at the SE Precinct", where we'll be handing out helmets to kids and maybe fixing up some bikes on site, too. We love to get out into the larger community and take our motto of "Teaching Shills, Building Community" to the people.

Finally, CBPO volunteers are active in lots of bicycling initiatives around the city, all designed to help make Omaha a friendlier place for slower, human-powered transportation - notably, for bicyclists and pedestrians. We're active participants in Omaha Bikes ("the voice of citizen cyclists"), in the Mayor's Bike/Pedestrian Advisory Committee, and the new Transportation Master Plan Update, to name a few. Bicycles have the potential to help knit communities together, in addition to the environmental and health benefits that come along with them, and we're excited at the possibilities that 2011 may bring for CBPO, for Gifford Park, and for Omaha.

Omaha's Snow Emergency Parking Regulations

Starting in the winter of 2010-2011, Omaha will be enforcing recently enacted snow emergency parking regulations. These regulations impact how and where cars can be parked on residential streets east of 72nd Street. During a declared snow emergency, cars must park on the odd number side of the street on odd calendar dates, and the even number side on even calendar dates. The south and east sides of streets contain odd numbers and the north and west sides of streets have even numbers. No parking zones indicated by the sign "No Parking - This Side of Block" are waived during a snow emergency. The odd/even side parking rules apply (the parking ban will be conditionally lifted during a snow emergency. Parking is permitted on the side of the street that is posted in this manner in accordance with the odd/even side parking rules).
