This year the 28th Annual National Night Out (NNO) will be observed on Tuesday, August 2nd. The NNO is known as America's Night Out Against Crime. The goal of NNO is to promote neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships in a fight for a safer nation. The traditional activites associated with NNO are front porch vigils and leaving porch lights on overnight to make a statement against crime and to show support for local crime prevention agencies. This year, the Omaha Police Department and The Neighborhood Center are sponsoring a "Night Out For Neighbors" in conjunction with National Night Out. They ask that citizens donate cleaning supplies that will be donated to help local flood victims. Items needed are: rubber gloves, buckets, disinfectants, brushes, brooms, mops, safety glasses, garbage bags, clean rags, paper towels, bottled water, and Gatorade. Items can be dropped off at two locations in the Gifford Park neighborhood between the hours of 7 to 9 pm on Aug. 2nd: 33rd and Cass and 35 Ave. and **Davenport**. In addition, items can be dropped off from Aug.1 through Aug. 5th, 9am to 4 pm, at any Omaha Police or Fire Department location, or the Neighborhood Center, 115 South 49th Ave. The final drop off site will be the Target parking lot at 72nd and Dodge St. on Saturday, August 6th, from 9 am to 11 am. #### **News From The Midtown Neighborhood Alliance**

The Midtown Neighborhood Alliance (MNA) along with neighborhood alliances from around the city will participate in National Night Out for Neighbors. See page 1 for the details to donate flood relief cleaning supplies for neighborhoods affected by the recent Missouri River flooding.

Many thanks to all the private individuals and businesses in the midtown area who donated funds to put on the Annual Fireworks Show at Field Club. This event has become a favorite among neighbors in the Field Club area. If you are interested assisting us with the continued success of the July 3rd show, please contact **Jim Farho**: Jim.Farho@continuumww.com.

The Re-Tree Midtown effort raised nearly \$20,000 this year in grant money. Two planting projects were completed to date: Bemis Park (which included an eagle scout project) and the Dodge Street Corridor on the south side of 68th for the Elmwood Park Neighborhood Association. Three more projects are currently scheduled: 35th and Dodge (Blackstone Neighborhood), Schroeder-Vogel Park at Saddle Creek and Pine (Aksarben-Elmwood Park Neighborhood), and Walnut Hill.

The MNA Fireworks Stand sold almost \$58,000 worth of fireworks during the 12 day allotted sales period. Volunteer support from neighborhoods was poor since two families worked most of the shifts. A preliminary estimate for MNA's profit is \$3,500.

Redevelopment Effort at the Austin Apartments - 38th and Davenport America First Real Estate purchased the Austin and intends to spend nearly \$5 million on electrical, mechanical, plumbing and rehabilitation of each apartment. 3703 Davenport LLC was created to develop this venture. The result is intended to be 60 single-bedroom units; today there are 54 substandard units leasing at below market rates. Six basement units will be constructed to comply with ADA standards. The project seeks to include TIF redevelopment funds in the amount of \$400,000 for the rehab.

The project is applying for historic tax credits thru NSHPO administering the program for the US Park Service. Building permits for \$1.5 million have been let and contractors are on site.

#### **Business District and Neighborhood Survey**

As we have mentioned in past newsletters, the Neighborhood Survey which started last summer, is continuing. On Thursday, July 14th, we had over 20 people convene in the business district to tour the area, talk to business people, photograph and to get to know what it is about Gifford Park that makes it so dynamic (see page 6 for photo). The people who came were from the consulting team that the **Omaha Chamber of** Commerce has hired: Lamp Rynearson, Alley Poyner Macchietto, Steve Jensen Consulting, and HRA out of New York. The City of Omaha, the Omaha Chamber of Commerce and Destination Midtown were also present along with a handful of our own Gifford Park current and past presidents attending. It was a great morning to have a tour considering what type of weather we've been enduring lately. It was a two hour tour and after going from business district to Community Garden and beyond, the group then proceeded to the other 3 neighborhoods they planned to tour that day. The other neighborhoods were the Park Avenue, Leavenworth Street, and Vinton Street areas. All of these areas will be part of a future master plan and recommendation report. As the summer progresses, we will be hearing more from these consultants. Keep an eye out for future public presentations.

# **Building Addition Final Phase Of Duchesne's Capital Campaign**

In celebration of its 125th Anniversary, Duchesne Academy launched a capital campaign to finance numerous renovation projects that have greatly enhanced the students' experiences at the school. Updates have included renovation and construction of state-of-the-art science labs, new art studios, darkroom & kiln room, installation of a new heating/ cooling system, and completion of a new athletic facility that includes a top notch training and conditioning room, large fitness center, and expanded bleachers in the gym. For the final phase of this capital campaign, Duchesne will begin work on a new addition to the building. This addition will include a barrier-free entrance from the student parking lot, a centrally located five-story elevator, an elegant lobby off of the performing arts center with an adjacent catering kitchen, and an enhanced student entrance with a new atrium staircase from the courtyard into the building.

The addition of the barrier-free entrance and elevator will help Duchesne meet compliance with ADA requirements. The new performing arts center lobby will be useful for social gatherings and special events and will provide greater space for school assemblies and performances. Health and safety issues wuch as new fire doors, an expanded sprinkler system, electrical updates, installation of air conditioning in the performing arts center, and lobby and improvements in the fine arts will also be addressed.

This project will improve the overall use of the historical campus, most notably the used of the wing of the building that was built in 1931. In addition to the updates to the performing arts center, this project will greatly enhance the student entrance and create improved access to the beautiful courtyard and cafeteria.

To learn more about these future improvements and to tour this historically distinctive building, plan on attending the August GPNA General Meeting on Thursday, August 11, which will be held at Duchesne. (See page 1 for meeting details.)

One of the reasons I volunteered to be one of the bad guys was that I felt that keeping properties up, at least to minimum standards, improves the neighborhood as a whole, and influences the perception of people passing through that this is a desirable neighborhood in which to live (which it is, of course). #### **Teen Market Garden**

Our new four by eight foot cedar tool shed is erect and looks beautiful. Huge thanks to our volunteers for pouring the concrete pad and erecting the shed: **John Barna, Chris Foster, Al Moellenbeck, Francisco Jimenez, Diego** and **Elena Carlson**. Many thanks also to **Dana Carlton-Flint** for obtaining two local grants to fund the project materials: Mayor Suttle's Neighborhood Grant 2011 and the Peter Kiewit Foundation 2010.

We were excited to be chosen by Omaha Venture Group earlier this spring for a capacity building grant. No More Empty Pots was awarded \$4,300 to assist us in building a curriculum for TMG which will be available to anyone wishing to start a similar program for teens.

July 30th will be our first day at the Outdoor Market at Midtown Crossing. We'll be there for five weeks selling an array of produce and flowers from E & E, Fruit Fly Farm, and Persephone & Co. Please stop by our stand and see what's growing!

Our CSA endeavor met several challenges this year, namely the June wind storm which caused a tree limb to take out a power pole behind the garden. OPPD, Qwest and Creighton were able to clean up the mess and erect a new pole, however considerable damage and compaction occurred to several plots. But things are slowly starting to pick up and we'll offer our Veggie Box Program through September.

#### **Gifford Park Dining Bites**

If you have not had an opportunity to go to the neighborhood's latest restaurant you are missing out. Marrakech Restaurant located at 504 N 33rd St. recently opened its doors and is providing diners a taste of Morocco. Since discovering Marrakech in June I have frequented the restaurant many times, especially after visiting the Gifford Park Neighborhood Market on Friday nights. I am amazed each time I go how flavorful the food is and how the owners, Mohamed Ishmail & Drissi Moussa, have turned their passion for Moroccan food into a wonderful addition to the midtown area (see page 6 for photo).

I have tried a few appetizers and would recommend the humus with pita bread, and Zaalouk, which is similar to an eggplant ragu - it is really delicious! For entrees the Saffron Lemon Chicken served with rice and mixed vegetables is very well put together. This entree had the right amount of flavor to make istwell worth coming back to try again. The Curry Chicken is a favorite of my brother in law; it also comes with rice and vegetables. It contains the precise amount of curry spice and will not overpower you. My favorite is the Pesto Chicken and if you're not interested in having the platter with rice and vegetables you can order the paninisandwich version. I would also suggest that you try the mint tea that comes iced or hot; it is exceptional! On one occasion I was able to try one of their Avocado Smoothies - it should be added as a permanent menu item – incredible! The best part of the restaurant is the owners/chefs/waiters, and hostess Nicole Wagner. When you dine in their establishment they treat you like family.

The restaurant attracts people from all over the city down to 33rd St. I have seen rock stars, local celebrities and the average college student. For an added benefit you can enjoy the eclectic details of the space (courtesy of the landlord, **Glen Burns**) that includes stain glass windows from the "Lazy Leopard Lounge" (that used to operate at 77th and Dodge St). It is fun just to view the details of the space.

Marrakech is affordable. The average entree is between \$7.99 and \$10.99. The hours are from 10am to 10pm, offering later hours until 12pm on Friday and Saturday nights. The Gifford Park neighborhood should be proud to have such a wonderful addition to the neighborhood. So when you are looking for a new restaurant, stop by and give Marrakech a try - you will not be disappointed.

A few weeks ago, Destination Midtown led a group through the neighborhood as part of their Neighborhood Business District Project kick-off, and I was pleased to have the Community Bike Shop as their first stop of the day. The hope is that this effort will lay out the case for more sustainable economic development in the Gifford Park area, and CBPO is happy to participate. Thanks for coming by.

Open hours at the Shop have been busy busy. If you would like to learn more about how to fix up your bike or would like to volunteer your time to help us out, we'd be happy to see you. Our hours are Wed/Thurs, 6-8pm and Sat, noon-4. We've got lots of people using the shop these days, so if you come in for help, please be patient, and if you're coming in to volunteer, thank you!

We've been out in the community, too. So far this summer, we've helped out at two city-run bike events for kids: one at the Kroc Center in South O, where we helped organize a bike rodeo and helped refurbish nearly 60 bikes that were then raffled off to neighborhood kids, and then another at Miller Park in North O, where we tuned up a few dozen bikes that were then raffled off. It's so great to see so many happy kids with their new bikes. We've also been managing Omaha's new B-cycle public bike share program. Next time you're in the UNO/Aksarben Village area, check out the blue bikes!

Finally, our bicycle maintenance classes are going strong and will continue into the fall. For more information, please see our website
