This was the sixth year in a row an anonymous dentist made a wonderful donation of 300 toothbrushes - volunteers gave one to each child just moments before the actual hunt. Volunteers picked up litter and raked portions of the park before putting out candy, treats, and other prizes in the four age groups (0-4, 5-6, 7-9, 10-12). The park was in pretty good shape since we had the Spring Cleanup the week before. As always, out of the thousands of pieces of candy, it took a matter of a few minutes for the kids to pick the park clean of goodies and prizes. From the President

On Tuesday, April 22, two soccer goals were dropped off in Gifford Park by the City of Omaha Parks and Rec Department. It was an exciting day for me...and for many others in Gifford Park.

For many years, Gifford Park residents have been asking for soccer goals in our park. So, last fall, I wrote two grants for money to buy soccer goals. As part of the process I needed to get permission from the city to place goals in our park. The permission we got was a provisional one: we could place goals in the park as long as they are not permanent and can be removed. Unfortunately, we only got one of the grants and that was not enough to buy two soccer goals. However, in the process I was made aware that the Parks and Rec department had some older goals that they were no longer using. I quickly contacted them and they said they would be happy to deliver two goals to Gifford Park in the Spring. And here they are!

The evening they arrived Pablo Saavedra and his boys dug the goals into the ground to secure them and in less than an hour there were over twenty people playing a game of soccer. Our house overlooks the baseball/ soccer field in the park and I have been tickled to see that there has been a group of soccer players gathering to play EVERY night since the goals went

The goals do need a little bit of love,

though. In the next several weeks we'll be using the grant money we did win to buy new nets and a new paint job for the goals. We'll also be buying some field paint to mark off the playing field.

With the addition of these goals in the park, two bigger projects are moving forward. The first is a dream to start an official Futbol Club in Gifford Park. Currently we have our free summer soccer program for 3-8 years olds. (See the flyer in this newsletter for more info on that!) But Pablo is also beginning to organize the older kids to play as well. With enough momentum, we're not far from having a team that could compete across the city!

The other project is one that Martin Janousek, I and several others have been plugging away at for some time now: an official youth-size soccer field in Turner Park North. Though this project requires quite a bit more money, as well as cooperation with the city and the state, it is slowly moving forward. We believe that our neighborhood and surrounding neighborhoods could use a space dedicated to the game of soccer. And if a Gifford Park FC does take shape under Pablo's leadership, they're going to need a dedicated space to practice and play! I think the amount of activity happening with the new goals in Gifford Park is a testament to the need for a dedicated space for soccer in Gifford Park Neighborhood!

So, join in the fun, grab your soccer ball and cleats and go enjoy the newest addition to our park!

No sooner had we taken a bite when Chris Foster's big yellow pick-up came barreling up Webster Street. Eric Purcell was at the wheel, his two young children beside him. He parked directly in front of our house, got out, slammed the truck door, and yelled in our direction, "I need muscles!" Who? Us? I looked around the porch, wondering if I'd missed someone with considerably more testosterone and upper-body strength hanging around the potted geraniums. Eric's kids hopped out, confident they were up for whatever Daddy had in mind.

As we walked out to the curb, Eric explained that he had asked the work crew if he could take one of the logs to use as terracing in his backyard. The log was heavy and solid, nine feet long and a foot in diameter. "Two on each side," Eric instructed as he positioned himself at the end. There we were, a guy lifting a large log, assisted by three little kids and an ectomorphic lady in a dress and sandals. He got one end up into the truck bed, then shoved the rest in despite our being in the way.

"Thanks!" he said, and the three of them hopped back in the truck and drove away. Maria and I resumed our lunch on the porch.

In how many neighborhoods could this happen? Did Eric hit us up for "help" because we looked like we would actually be any? Or was this about teaching our kids something about neighbors and community that they could never learn in a social studies book?

Muscles is not on the top of the list of things Maria and I have to offer. But Maria has a million-dollar smile and I have a pen. With which I can tell you that it's people and events like this that make Gifford Park the only place in Omaha I ever want to live.

We hope you plan to attend our Community Garden Season Opening, Saturday, May 10, 10:00 AM to noon at the community garden (35th & Cass Street) – it's open to everyone. We plan to have a variety of family activities including Youth Garden program registration, information on community garden, Teen Market Garden and Big Muddy Urban Farm, "Ask the Master Gardener" from the County Extension Office, free library cards and books, Mother's Day take home project, face-painting, music, garden items sale, free seeds, plants and refreshments (while supplies last), and see the 16 chickens (now one year old).

Recent rains and warmer weather have helped to green up our yards, gardens and trees after a cold and dry winter. In mid-April we started our Wednesday work nights and will continue each Wednesday 6 to 8 PM through the growing season. During these times water and garden tools will be available for plot renters and anyone else interested in helping maintain the community garden – there is never a shortage of weeding! It's a good time to stop by the garden to see neighborhood friends or check out what's growing - things are changing fast! Community Bicycle Project Update

Longer days and warmer weather are bringing vibrant activity to the Gifford Park neighborhood and the Community Bike Project. We're excited to be expanding our hours and programming to keep up with the summertime energy.

Our Open Shop program is now running five days a week for 3-6 hours each day. In addition to helping bicyclists repair and maintain their bikes, our Open Shop program has been well-utilized by adult Earn-a-Bike participants and youth volunteers. With all the activity, we're looking for enthusiastic volunteers to help facilitate Open Shop sessions. During Open Shop, we always need volunteers to help teach bike maintenance and coordinate shop use. Email me at charles@communitybikeproject.org if you'd like to help out.

Through Kids' Bike Club, we are also expanding our Youth Earn-a-Bike program. Starting in late May, the Bike Club will give 6-9 year olds the opportunity to earn a bike by attending four one-hour classes on introductory bike mechanics, riding skills, and community service. Registration for Kids' Bike Club is available at www.communitybikeproject.org/programs or at the shop. Kids' Bike Club is also a great opportunity to volunteer in a setting more focused on riding than wrenching.

Youth Earn-a-Bike also continues to grow. In April, we had four brothers complete Youth Earn-a-Bike together and a young man participated in Youth Earn-a-Bike for a second time to build a bike for his older sister. In May, we will begin including a water bottle, helmet, and lock with each bike earned.

In addition to getting bikes back out to the community through our Earn-a-Bike and Open Shop programs, we are looking forward to organizing some summer rides to help encourage biking as a fun, healthy, and family-friendly activity. Starting in June, we will be hosting group rides on the last Sunday of the month.

Gifford Park Neighborhood School Effort

As of this newsletter our Gifford Park and surrounding neighborhoods are still in the hunt to bring back a neighborhood school. As you probably know in 1999 our neighborhood school Yates Elementary at 32nd & Davenport Street was closed by OPS because the building was too small to handle the number of children in our neighborhood. Currently of the 353 Yates attendance area children in grades K-6, 165 are assigned to Kellom School, and 188 of our children are bused to 39 different schools in the district. Letters of support to bring back a neighborhood school have been sent to OPS from the Gifford Park NA, Joslyn Castle NA, Dundee Memorial Park NA, Bemis Park NA, Leavenworth NA, Midtown Neighborhood Alliance, Councilman Chris Jerram, First Presbyterian Church, and residents.

OPS will hold three community meetings in early May to get feedback on options for building upgrades. The meetings are designed to help the district collect input from parents, staff, students and residents as it moves forward with a facilities master plan and weighs a potential bond issue for

school construction. The new master plan will try to balance enrollment and demographic trends with school space and determine the effect that school configurations can have on programming.

The community meetings are broken up into three geographical areas:

May 6, 6-9pm at South High School May 7, 6-9pm at Burke High School May 8, 6-9pm at Benson High School

The meeting format is similar to the strategic plan sessions held last October. They will begin with a 30-minute presentation detailing conditions of schools, and attendees will then break up into small groups for discussion and a survey.
