The weather was ideal and it was a perfect way for volunteers and Earn-a-Bike graduates to see all of their dedicated bike work put to good use.

Along the way, youth graduates practiced signaling and group riding etiquette while rolling smoothly along on the bikes they fixed and overhauled during Bike Project classes. #### **A Kite Flying Festival**

On October 18th some kids & adults came together for a kites festival at Gifford Park. It was a small gathering, but hopefully will lead to more of its kind in the future. A big thanks to everyone who came out to enjoy the park and a fun activity. Look out for a second Kite Flying Festival this spring!

When Oscar asked me to help him put on a kites festival, he'd just made one. It was a piece of orange nylon fabric cut into an approximate diamond, held to dowels with clear packing tape. A longer bit of nylon attached to the end was a tail; string tied to the cross bar let him run with it. This was in August, after a Play Lab workshop that I had hosted downtown at the Bemis Center. Before leaving, he ran up to me so excited he could hardly get the words out: "I want to- could you help me- I want to make kites, with other people! Let's make it so everyone can get together and make kites like this. And then we can fly them!"

Oscar's idea, although forgotten by both of us almost instantly, was carried back to me on a gust of wind in early October. We decided to organize a kite day, and I suggested Gifford Park as a location. He made fliers with pictures of kites and the materials we'd used to make them. We advertised on Facebook and through the Community Garden email list, and on the bulletin board at the school where I work & where Oscar is a first grader. His mom got together kite making supplies; Chris Foster helped to transport some tables into the greenspace behind the tennis courts; some families showed up; kids wandered through; and the kite festival was on. Kites were constructed with basic materials and decorated with ribbon and sharpies. Everyone was eager to make a kite, though no-one would claim to be an expert. We trial & erred our way along until every kid had a kite.

But there was one thing missing... Not a breath of wind blew on October 18. It was least windy fall day I have ever experienced in Omaha; where the leaves of the cottonwood trees hung strangely still, and the plastic flagging I'd hung as decorations stood immobile stretched between two trees. All of the adults laughed, how could it be that kite day was windless? But we helped the kids make their kites from plastic bags, newspapers and dowels, and the kids ran and launched them, the kites took off behind the speeding runners, and everyone was panting and laughing by the end.

It was fun to use the park as a spot to host a community event, which brought together neighbors as well as people from out of Gifford Park. I am convinced that facilitating activities for kids is a fantastic way to build community, and look forward to using the park space for more events of this kind. Hope to see you!



#### Iowa/Nebraska IN the Neighborhood Conference "Celebrating Strong Empowered Neighborhoods"

On Friday, Oct. 10 and Saturday, Oct. 11, 155 individuals attended the First Iowa/Nebraska IN the Neighborhood Conference at the South Omaha Campus of Metro Community College which presented programs, solutions and experiences to help neighborhood leaders and residents find solutions in their own community. On Friday attendees were able to go on unique tours in both Omaha and Council Bluffs that gave them the opportunity to see the Gifford Park and Dahlman Neighborhoods, outstanding murals around the city, historic neighborhoods in Council Bluffs and a bike tour through downtown Omaha. NUSA (Neighborhoods USA) representatives took a tour of our Gifford Park Neighborhood with tour stops at the community garden, chicken ranch, Big Muddy Urban Farm, Shelterbelt/SNAP Theatre, Community Bicycle Shop, Maud Boutique, Gifford Park and ended with delicious lunch and conversation at Marrakech Restaurant. Saturday brought opening remarks from Omaha Mayor Jean Stothert and Council Bluffs Mayor Matt Walsh. Mayor Stothert recognized the Gifford Park Pride's Gold Award for neighborhood newsletters. A Luncheon Keynote Speaker, Gus Newport, a nationally renowned community activist who encourages neighborhood planning from the "bottom up, not top-down." Gus answered many questions for local neighborhoods who want to be in the know on national solutions. Plans are being made now to continue the event next year by combining it with the Restore Omaha tour the first weekend of October.

#### **Remembering Dan Begley**

His light was on before we rose and it was on when we went to bed. Dan Begley's home on Webster Street was our neighborhood lighthouse. When I saw the glow from the TV or the retired mailman on his front stoop, I knew all was right with the world. The comfort came not only in knowing that Mr. Begley was always around.

It came in the news he always brought, in the connections he made, in the easy-going, friendly way he had with people. But the light has been out, the porch has stood empty and if Mr. Begley is keeping watch, it's from much farther away than across the street. Our dear neighbor died Oct. 17 after his big heart finally gave out. He was 77.

The wake service and funeral were lovely, very Irish and - son Danny had joked - only missing campaign signs by the altar. If you didn't know Mr. Begley, you could easily pick out his yard. It would be the one planted with the names of Democrats. He was an ardent Irish Catholic Democrat and once gave my children a prized possession a framed photograph of JFK.

We only knew Mr. Begley for four years, but it felt like forever, which was the kind of effect he had on people. He met my husband first on move-in night. The rented truck had gotten stuck in the interminable winter of 2009-10 and Mr. Begley had come to the rescue with a plank of wood and a few cold ones.

That began a friendship that taught us a lot about the neighborhood. He was a walking Omaha history book, offering an interesting take on the antics and heroics of the past. He could delineate many family trees and tell you how people were connected. He rooted me to my own past: "Grace?" he said when we first met. "As in 3416 Hawthorne?" That's where my dad's family had grown up. Mr. Begley had delivered mail there.

He rooted us to Gifford Park, a neighborhood that was like a hidden secret. He introduced us



to fellow neighbors and I discovered the wonderfully rich roots of families that go way back, like the Viponds and the Wilwerdings. Mr. Begley was not an original Gifford Parkian. He was born and raised in south Omaha, attended St. Agnes grade school and took streetcars across town to Sacred Heart High School in north Omaha. He was was in Army and served in Germany. He had 45-year career with the U.S. Postal Service. He retired in 2001.

Mr. Begley and his late wife, Mary Kay, raised four boys in their home on Webster Street: Brian, Mark, Danny and Jim. They were longtime members of the Cathedral parish. And both were politically involved. Dan Begley had a more behindthe-scenes role as a major supporter - driving candidates around, introducing them to the south Omaha Democratic political machine and otherwise attending their rallies and fundraisers. Mary Kay Begley was elected to the Metropolitan Utilities District board and held her seat for 21 years. Their son, Jim Begley, is now on the M.U.D. board. Mr. Begley cared for his wife in the midst of his own cancer. She died in 2010.

We moved in shortly thereafter. Mr. Begley was a regular presence on our porch, in our back yard, in our home. He came to our kids' birthday parties. He watched my sick child so I could run the others to school. He caught our ever-escaping dog. And he always lugged our garbage cans to

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the back and fished our paper from the curb to place it right in front of our door. He loved being in the know - and we had fun dishing about Omaha politics. But he didn't like bad news and he wasn't a gossip. "Tell me something good," he'd say.

He was hopeful. He was hospitable. He was part of what made Webster Street our home. Mr. Begley was tickled - and heartened by all the good things happening in our neighborhood. When we were driving back from voting in the May primary, I pointed out our friendly, neighborhood chickens on 33rd and Webster and he smiled and said now he'd seen everything. He was thrilled by the garden, the market and all the ways in which Gifford Park veterans and newcomers alike were stitching the neighborhood together.

His light may be out on Webster Street but Mr. Begley shines on in the friendliness of strangers and goodness of others.

#### Big Muddy Urban Farm Named to "Good Food Org Guide"

The James Beard Foundation and Food Tank have included six Nebraska organizations in the first annual "Good Food Org Guide" including Gifford Park's own Big Muddy Urban Farm. The Guide highlights nonprofit organizations that are doing exemplary work in the United States in the areas of food and agriculture, nutrition and health, hunger and obesity, and food justice. The organizations selected spotlight efforts focused on community building and engagement, advocacy, and service.

These groups include organizations who combat childhood obesity; prevent food waste; educate consumers on healthy, nutritious food choices; create networks of social entrepreneurs; highlight solutions for restoring the health of people and the planet; inspire and educate individuals to cook more of their own food; and protect public health, human health, and the environment.

Congratulations to Big Muddy Urban Farm for the honor. We're proud to have you in the neighborhood!

#### **Gifford Park Neighborhood School**

There is not much new to report until we see if voters in the Omaha Public Schools district approve a \$421 million bond issue on the November 4th ballot. The OPS board voted unanimously to put the bond issue on the November ballot to pay for school construction projects, including building upgrades and new schools. If the bond issue passes there is a line item in the current proposed OPS facility plan to build a new elementary school in our neighborhood, the location yet to be determined.

As you probably know in 1999 our neighborhood school Yates Elementary at 32nd & Davenport Street was closed by OPS because the building was too small to handle the number of children in our neighborhood. Currently of the 353 children K-6th grade in the Yates attendance area, 165 are assigned to Kellom School and 188 are bused to 39 different schools in the district. Letters of support to bring back a neighborhood school have been sent to OPS from the Gifford Park NA, Joslyn Castle NA, Dundee Memorial Park NA, Bemis Park NA, Leavenworth NA, Midtown Neighborhood Alliance, Councilman Chris Jerram, First Presbyterian Church, and residents.


