The 2015 Restore Omaha Conference brought together preservation-minded individuals for a day of networking, learning and sharing.

The opening reception on February 27 was held at The Pella at Blackstone. Attendees toured the new event space in the former Pella Lutheran Church at 41st and Harney Streets while enjoying food and a special "Pella Punch" created by Hap Abraham Catering who leases the space from owner Brad Iwen. Restoration Exchange Executive Director Kristine Gerber shared the background of how this building was saved and invited John Lund and Dan Houlihan to the stage to talk about the resurgence of the 40th and Farnam that they have helped make happen. Restoration Exchange, with the help of Restore Omaha keynote speaker Bernice Radle also introduced "Preservation Speed Dating" to the event, a chance for attendees to present a restoration problem they are having in front of the attendees who could offer their advice.

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Update from the Bike Shop

With spring and summer on the horizon, all of us at the Bike Project are looking forward to helping more folks fix and earn bikes. We're also looking forward to the return of our seasonal rides and annual events.

If you need a refurbished bike to take advantage of the warming weather, there are still a number of ways to get yourself rolling. Kids' Bike Club gives kids aged 5-9 the opportunity to earn a free bike and helmet by attending 4 classes on Saturdays from 11AM-12PM. Youth Earn-a-Bike, for youth aged 10-15, shows young cyclists how to completely overhaul and safely ride a bike and provides a free bike, lock, and helmet. Adult Earn-a-Bike, for individuals 16 and over, requires 5-10 hours of shop volunteering in exchange for a free bike. Adult Earn-a-Bike now provides lowincome individuals with a free light set and U-lock to complement their bike.

If you already have a bike but need to tune it up for the bicycling season, our Open Shop hours are for you! Volunteer mechanics can walk you through any repair/maintenance process and the shop is equipped with six repair stations complete with all of the necessary tools.

The Sunday Funday Ride, our monthly familyfriendly and all-ages "slow roll" group ride, will be returning in March or April (depending on the weather). Join Bike Project volunteers, Earn-a-Bike graduates, and friends for a casual ride on streets and trails the last Sunday of every month. We meet at the shop at 6 p.m. and roll out at 6:30



p.m. Sunday Funday rides are so much fun!

ExhiBIKEtion, a bike-themed art exhibit, will also return to the Bike Project on March 20 6-9 p.m. Local artists and cycling enthusiasts will be displaying bike inspired artworks inside the shop for one night only. Support local art and the Bike Project at ExhiBIKEtion.

Lids for Kids, an annual fundraiser ride to support our Youth Earn-a-Bike programs, is on Sunday, May 3. Start the cycling season with a fun and invigorating 25 or 50 mile ride that starts in Gifford Park, travels up to Neale Woods, and visits Fort Calhoun before returning to the Bike Project. Neighborhood Projects Update - School, Soccer Field, and Community Center

The Gifford Park Neighborhood Association (GPNA) continues to work with various stakeholders on three very important projects with big impacts on the future of ours and surrounding neighborhoods. The three projects are: 1.) building a new neighborhood elementary school; 2.) keeping the Yates building as a community center; and 3.) repurposing Turner Park North to be a recreational youth soccer field. We presented these project updates as part of our vision at our GPNA holiday banquet in December and at the February general meeting. Because these projects are related and affect each other, we have been meeting to seek support from the stakeholders involved including Omaha Public Schools (OPS) Board & Administration, Creighton University/CHI Health, Omaha Planning Department, Omaha Parks Department, Senator Sara Howard, Councilman Chris Jerram, Restoration Exchange Omaha, philanthropic foundations, surrounding neighborhood associations, and local residents.

With passage on November 4 of the \$421 million Omaha Public Schools (OPS) bond issue, efforts now focus on implementation. Specifically for our neighborhood, there is nearly \$17 million slated in the OPS facility plan to build a new elementary school in our neighborhood, the location is still a big question and this is where things get complicated.

We have been unified and clear since last year about the goals and needs of our neighborhood children and families, and the neighborhood as a whole. We do not want OPS to tear down the existing historic Yates School building at 32nd & Davenport Street, nor tear down existing homes around Yates. We would like to see the Yates building continue to serve as public use (as the existing programs do) and even serve more people as a community center for ours and surrounding neighborhoods in the future. We believe the Yates building and location lend itself very well for a community center with Gifford Park on the west and Turner Park North on the east. The GPNA is currently working with the City on plans for a recreational youth soccer field and walk/bike trail in Turner Park North.

Over the next few weeks OPS will host community meetings to discuss the Student Assignment Plan which will help determine school attendance boundaries. We have been told there is a thorough process for deciding location and timeline, and our neighborhood will be involved in this decision-making process.

We have also met with Creighton University to discuss any possibilities of them offering to sell existing parking lot property near 32nd Street between Burt and Webster, or sell other Creighton-owned property that OPS could use to build a new school. These locations would be advantageous for building an "urban" designed school that would fit into our older neighborhood and address parking, traffic and safety concerns, as well as saving the current Yates building. Creighton is still figuring out their master plans and we plan to continue meeting as plans evolve with both OPS and Creighton.

Besides the school location and design questions, there will eventually be discussions regarding school principal, curriculum & programs, PTA/PTO, neighborhood partnerships, etc. – this is where we will need your help and involvement to work toward the best solutions for the future success of the school and neighborhood. Adventure Playground

This winter I have been wondering on an idea: How to make an Adventure Playground in Gifford Park? I brought this idea to the GPNA board last October. We got all excited, and thought we'd keep it in mind. Well, the months have gone by, and I am so excited to announce that Gifford Park will indeed have its own Adventure Playground - the first of its kind in Nebraska! It won't be the kind of playground we tend to imagine when we think of what is usually installed by cities for kids - there will not be any plastic slides or monkey bars or rubber matting. Rather, it will provide the kids of Gifford Park with space, tools, and raw materials so that they can decide on their own forms and shelters to play in. There will be hand tools, shovels, barrels, pallets, sticks, wood, rope, tires, and tarps! It will be staffed by helpful adults who will be there to assist the kids in building things.

Kids have always been making huts and hideouts, and taking over spaces with their play. I saw a lot of it last summer when I was doing Play Lab at the Gifford Park Neighborhood Market, and see it when I am just walking around: a little stick fort up against a fence, somebody's tree house in a backyard, or chalk lines drawn on the street as a baseball diamond. Kids are ingenious with their play, and our neighborhood is full of these clever, creative people. The Adventure Playground will provide another space for kids to be kids. I think of play as a valuable and necessary aspect to healthy living, and am very excited to provide for more play in our neighborhood starting this summer!

The Adventure Playground will be at the Gifford Park Community Garden, located in a parcel of land just west of the big square plot that Big Muddy used for potatoes last year. We will commence work in early spring by moving some fences to open up and define the space. We will use one of the sheds in the garden for tool and materials storage. The Adventure Playground will open on Saturdays after the Youth Garden activities, beginning May 16. More hours will be added





as needed, in response to interest and volunteer availability.

You can get involved with the Adventure Playground by coming to the Adventure Playground meetup and information session on Saturday, April 11th at 9 am at Yates Community Center. At this meeting we will discuss in more depth the playground, volunteering, materials donations, and answer any questions that folks may have. People interested in volunteering can stay for a short session on Playwork immediately following the info session.




Better Know a Board Member
