Adventure Playground

Saturday, August 29, concluded the Youth Garden season. With that clear benchmark in place, we can reflect on what the first summer at the Adventure Playground has been all about! But don't worry! The playground will continue to be open on Saturdays, 12-4 p.m. into Fall and Winter.

We started with a very blank slate: a fence and a sloping yard with a couple of trees at the top greeted the first visitors. The playground was stocked full of donated wooden furniture, rope, fabric, paint, tires and some tools. The first kids to visit the Playground were quick to bash apart most of the furniture. Some small enclosures went up, signs were made, and we were off! The trees became anchoring points for much of our construction activity. Two large spools donated by Don Newland, helped a structure take form at the base of the trees. There, kids were able to work week after week on their fortress, which has multiple hiding areas, a bridge, and swinging ropes behind it. A favorite challenge is to step from the bridge down to the largest rope, and swing balance between the high and low ropes!

As the weeks passed, we accumulated a group of kids who became regular visitors. These kids are the heart of the playground, carrying ideas through from week to week. Work commenced on the side of the garage, where painted scenes have ebbed and flowed. Visitors from other parts of the city dropped in, some multiple times, with donations, grandkids, and friends.

From toddlers to late teenagers, the Adventure Playground has been a fun place for everyone. Some of our busiest days were delightful, as a large range of ages played together in the sun. The materials on hand were flexible enough to allow for many different skill levels of building activity, from blanket forts to more fortified pallet shacks, to the spool fortress described above. Over this summer I have been grateful and amazed for the variety of visitors, each of whom



bring their own style of play to the playground. When I could find a moment to stand back and marvel at the brisk activity happening all around me, I was consistently moved. The kids have never ceased to impress me through their unrelenting willingness to try new things, be flexible, kind and thoughtful. I am also grateful beyond words for the dedicated volunteers who showed up again and again this summer to help guide and problem solve, making the playground a community bound together by a love of free play.

We have had very timely rains and that has meant very little need to water this year – maybe too much of a good thing has hurt the tomato crop this year. Our Gifford Park Community Garden will be one of a seven host gardens on this the fourth annual Tour de Garden event Sunday September 6, 9am to noon. Participating gardens are Omaha Bicycle Company (6015 Maple Street), City Sprouts (40th & Seward), Big Garden (34th & Ohio), John Pollack's Orchard (36th & Charles), Gifford Park Garden (35th & Cass), Dundee Garden (49th & Underwood), Benson Garden (60th & Hamilton). A Salsa competition will happen after the tour at the Benson Garden.

Our next pot luck dinner for our community gardeners, youth gardeners, Adventure Playground, volunteers and their families will be Sunday, September 20 at 4:30 p.m. Socialize, 5:00 p.m. dinner at 35th & Cass Streets. Besides our normal grilling of burgers and hot dogs, Chef Wilson Calixte (chef at Le Voltaire French Restaurant) will treat us to some entertaining food preparation and grilling, so be sure to come early around 4:30pm to enjoy his expertise.

Youth Garden Program 2015 Highlights

Now in its 12th year, 2015 was another great year for the Gifford Park Youth Garden (GPYG) program. It began May 9 with our "Season Opening" event and ended with our "Pizza Garden Harvest Party" August 29. In between these dates we had over 60 registered youth participants gardening on 44 raised beds (each 30"x30" plots), some children shared their plots.

Amazingly there were no rainouts again this year, although our tents came in handy a couple times it did rain.

Last newsletter I gave an update through week 10, here are highlights of the last five weeks of activities: Week 11 we learned what to do with all of those veggies we're growing with the Visiting Nurses Association (VNA) and their famous "Cooking Matters" class led by Anna Curry and Chef Wilson Calixte. They demonstrated valuable secrets to proper food preparation and cooking, and in the end we all enjoyed a healthy and delicious 'Asian Vegetable Stir Fry' meal from vegetables we grew in our gardens this summer. Week 12 Andrea Lawse taught us all about 'Herbs & Health Remedies'. She brought herbs for us to sample with our senses, and taught how we use them to improve our health. We also had a 'Garden Scavenger Hunt' organized by Mike Caban. Week 13 Chad Lebo (Cure) showed us fermentation and how to make sauerkraut from cabbage grown on-site; Brent Lubbert and Matt Cronin from Big Muddy Urban Farm with help from Eric & Annemarie Noll (one of the founding families of the community garden) and son Preston taught us how to make refrigerator pickles - as well as a variety of other vegetable/ herb combinations! It was exciting to learn a quick, easy way to save vegetables for later use! Week 14 Betsy Goodman (She works at Bloom Organics Farm, and she started Omaha's Common Soil Seed Library at the Benson Public Library) taught us all about seed saving. Besides Betsy's leadership, Brent and Matt from Big Muddy Urban Farm taught us about the cyclical nature of seed saving and how to use this process in our own gardens. Brent taught us how to save tomato seeds - which involve a fermentation, sorting, and drying process before the seeds become viable. Betsy took us on a "treasure hunt" around the community garden where we looked at different plants and learned how they are pollinated in order that they might produce seeds. Matt taught us how to collect and sift seeds from the plants once they are formed. Week 15 we celebrated another wonderful year the Youth Garden program with a Harvest Party!

We encourage our young gardeners to continue tending your plots for the rest of the growing season.

As you can see the program teaches youth of all ages how to grow our vegetables, prepare, eat, and share our harvest with others. Plus, the youth are creative with art, music, and poetry; explore our natural environment; and have fun while working together and getting our hands dirty. GPYG relies upon parents and volunteers

each week to provide snacks, lead lessons, and simply share their time with participating young people. Community Bicycle Shop

The summer season is always a whirlwind of activity at the Bike Project! We introduced some new programs and events and grew other initiatives with the help of dedicated volunteers and new neighborhood supporters. All of the activities increased our capacity to make bicycling accessible, reliable, and fun for Omaha and helped build community in the Gifford Park neighborhood and beyond.

In April, the Bike Project partnered with HDR, Inc. to refurbish 50 kids bikes with new tires, chains, and tubes. The like-new bikes were then donated to Youth Emergency Services, InCommon Community Development, and the Heart Ministry Center to benefit their clients.

In May, the Bike Project put on a second annual Lids for Kids fundraiser ride to support our Youth Earn-a-Bike programs. The ride brought together Gifford Park neighbors, Youth Earn-a-Bike graduates, volunteers, and friends of the shop. Many riders challenged themselves with a 50 mile ride to Fort Calhoun, including seven of our Youth Earn-a-Bike graduates!

Our Youth programming continued to grow this year. Kids' Bike Club ran for its first full season. 5-9 year olds consistently attended classes to earn bikes, often

assisted by older siblings who had graduated from Youth Earn-a-Bike. The Bike Project also started hosting weekly Youth Earn-a-Bike sessions at Omaha Home for Boys.

In June, we partnered with LiveWell and Lutheran Family Services to provide 10 Karen and Nepali refugees with bikes, helmets, and locks. Participants learned how to safely ride on the streets and how to put their bikes on buses to make the most of their new transportation options.

We also collaborated with Big Muddy for the second Full Cycle Supper in June. This short bike tour and farm-to-table dinner at Big Muddy's urban farm plots was a great way to see the neighborhood and support two of Gifford Park's community building organizations. Watch for the fall Full Cycle Supper coming up on Sunday, September 27!

In July, the Youth Board completed its first term and celebrated by organizing a birthday party for the bike shop. Bike Project supporters played bike games, printed shirts, and enjoyed food while celebrating the Bike Project's 8th Birthday. The event was youth-led and awesome!

In August, we capped off summer with our best attended monthly Sunday Funday ride yet! 18 cyclists rode from the shop to Iowa via the pedestrian bridge. New Earn-a-Bike graduates, parents, and volunteers enjoyed the pleasant weather and celebrated another season of successful bike programming with a bike ride open to all ages and levels of cyclists.

One Sunday Funday rider had just earned his bike the previous day from Youth Emergency Services. On Saturday, we led a bike safety class and bike ride along the Field Club trail. 20 YES clients earned a free bike refurbished by Bike Project volunteers and a new U-lock by attending the class and ride.

As the temperature drops, the Bike Project will be staying busy with Open Shop, Youth Earn-a-Bike, and a Bike Build-a-Thon in November getting bikes ready for fall and winter riding and for another season of fun rides and events next year. Come volunteer at the Bike Project to help more people have access to bikes and all of the amazing benefits that come from bicycling!
