Strategic Planning Recap

This past November, the GPNA General Meeting was an inspiring evening that focused on the future of Gifford Park. Two trained facilitators from the Omaha Public Library – Maggie Rasmussen and Marvel Maring – led that portion of the meeting, which was organized with the help of Julie Smith from ONE Omaha (www.oneomaha.org). Here are some of the highlights from the discussion:

First, qualities that we value in Gifford Park are the diverse people (especially their welcoming and neighborly attitude), the history and identity of the neighborhood including its older buildings, the park and all the tree-lined streets, the walkability of the neighborhood, and all the programs and activities like the community garden, the market, the youth sports, etc.

Second, areas for improvement were creating a community center, having more businesses and services within the neighborhood, making sure businesses recycle, improving safety (included better lighting), having a way to turn left from eastbound Dodge; getting more families with kids to live here; and making sure diverse members of the neighborhood are brought into leadership positions.

From the brainstorming about an ideal Gifford Park, three areas to focus on included:

Yates was the leading vote-getter of the three topics but we decided to focus on the businesses district since there is already strong organizing around Yates. Ideas that emerged for the 33rd and California area included establishing a business improvement district or a merchants association, foster business incubators (especially a coffee shop), and improving the storefronts and design of the street (possibly through a Midtown Business Association Façade Improvement Grant).

In addition, we discussed the issue of new development coming into the neighborhood and how to get it right -- by working with the City of Omaha on improving the notification process for developers and potentially creating an officially recognized neighborhood plan for Gifford Park.

As you can see, we covered a lot of ground that night (which the GPNA Board will work on moving forward), but two comments stuck out in my mind.

From the President

Welcome to 2016 in the Gifford Park Neighborhood!

A new year starts with a new president, new board members, and new goals, but with the same enthusiasm and dedication to make the Gifford Park Neighborhood a great place to live, work, learn and play.

As a short introduction, I am Marie Hélène André, and I have been living in the neighborhood since September of 2013. I am married and I have one stepdaughter (16 years old). I work for Metropolitan Community College as the coordinator of MCC Express, where we offer ESL and GED classes for adult learners. As soon as my husband Adrian and I moved to Gifford Park, we became members of the GPNA, as we thought it was a good way to get to know our neighbors and the community. I got involved even more in the association last year, as a board member. I was impressed at how dynamic and active the neighborhood is all year round: meetings, market, various youth programs, community garden, Omaha Community Bike Project, etc.

Looking back at 2015, I am proud to say a lot has been accomplished... but there is still room for improvement (as Luther said in the last newsletter)!

One of the main topics of conversation last year was to get an elementary school back in the neighborhood. After the OPS bond issuance, we were hopeful we would see a new school soon in our neighborhood, while keeping Yates Community center. Thanks to your support, we started discussions with OPS and with Creighton University. One of our goals for 2016 is to make the Gifford Park Neighborhood a great place to learn and therefore to get a resolution on the new school for the neighborhood, and on maintaining Yates Community Center. Keep supporting the effort in 2016! The neighborhood is a great place to live and play, especially since the opening of the Sallie Foster Adventure Playground last summer: children are invited to come and invent, create, imagine while playing and having fun... This is unique in Omaha! Even more so since the treehouse was finished at the end of the fall. If you haven't seen it yet, just stop at the community garden and walk through the magic gate...!

The GPNA also strives to preserve and protect the neighborhood. Last year, the board met with a couple of developers to share our vision of the neighborhood, and influence their decisions on new developments. This year, we want to create a basic response plan for new development in the neighborhood: we want developers to know we care for our neighborhood, and we want them to take into consideration our vision of the future of the Gifford Park Neighborhood.

Finally, we want to keep doing what we have been doing well in previous years... and that is a lot! The Easter Egg Hunt (March 26), the Spring cleanup, the community and youth gardens, the Friday Neighborhood Market, the Tennis and Soccer programs, just to name a few. I want to mention the soccer program in particular: we want to get a resolution on Turner Park North, to build a new soccer field there.

A last word about what the Gifford Park Neighborhood does really well: celebrate diversity!

When we were looking for a home, Adrian and I had a list of criteria (old house, mature trees, green neighborhood, etc.). When we moved to the Gifford Park Neighborhood, we found more than 'just' a home. Luther Larson - 2015 GPNA Neighbor of the Year

The GPNA honored Luther Larson as our 2015 'Neighbor of the Year' at the 27th annual GPNA Holiday Banquet hosted by CHI Health - Creighton Health on December 3rd. Amazingly the GPNA board somehow kept this a secret all the way up to the announcement at the banquet, even from his wife Deb!

Before highlighting Luther's GPNA accomplishments. I wanted to share some personal background about Luther and his family. He was born in Albion, NE in 1957 and grew up on the family farm seven miles east of Petersburg, NE. Luther graduated from Augustana College in 1979 with a Computer Science/Math Bachelor's Degree (this explains why he is so good at analyzing neighborhood survey data and budgets!). He worked 34 years at Mutual of Omaha in the IT Department, and just retired in July 2013. Luther met Deb in Sioux Falls, SD where she attended Sioux Valley School of Nursing, they got married in 1979. Deb worked as an RN at UNMC until their second child was born and then she stayed home to raise the family. She homeschooled their youngest two children through high school. Luther & Deb have two sons, three daughters, and eleven grandchildren!

Luther's neighborhood involvement is equally impressive since moving into Gifford Park in summer 2006 at 3565 California St. (southeast corner of 36th & California). In 2008 he joined the GPNA board as an At Large Board Member. Luther then served as President and handled membership duties from 2011-2012. Being a numbers guy he then was treasurer in 2014. In 2015 Luther graciously accepted President duties again at the urging of the GPNA board, and has now settled back into At Large board member again...where he started!

Besides Luther's continuous leadership roles, his 'boots-on-the-ground' volunteer efforts include spring cleanups, Easter egg hunts, community garden, park cleanups, block parties, neighborhood survey, grants, and other activities. Speaking of grants, he was heavily involved with acquiring & installing new park benches, the bicycle rack/sculpture (northeast corner of Gifford Park), doggie-doo dispensers, and other neighborhood enhancements. As President, Luther was responsible for setting agendas, hosting board meetings, neighborhood development initiatives, and overall being accountable to the GPNA – it takes leadership and a big commitment to take on being President.

Luther & Deb have been involved with the Restore Omaha Conference and love fixing up older homes, and they are great at it. They have fixed up three old homes in Gifford Park and another in Joslyn Castle neighborhood (where they live now)...and presently working on another old fixer-upper. Luther (& Deb) has always been very supportive of so many of our GPNA programs and activities (and very supportive to me) – he is a true "team player", always willing to help, and cares very much for our neighborhood. California Bar History

The California Bar has been operating in the same location in Gifford Park on 33rd Street (510 N. 33rd St.) since July 1st 1937. It is one of the oldest bars in Omaha (the records are unclear but we believe it is the 3rd oldest bar in continual operation in the same location in Omaha).

The owner, Lilly Estes, is the 3rd owner and second family to own the bar. Founded by Joe Hill and his brother Tony and later Joe's wife June, the "Cali Bar" as locals call it has always been a great social networking site. The customers as is the neighborhood are a great melting pot of all types. Ninety plus percent of the customers are regulars. Everyone from the Creighton crowd to the "Hipsters" to Doctors and Lawyers and the working class intermingle like no other place in Omaha.

While years ago the drink options were sparse, the bar has evolved into a place where you can get some of the best craft beers and cocktails you can imagine for a "neighborhood bar". The bar received a tip of the hat from The Reader's Choice Best of the Big O for best Karaoke Bar as well as best Billiards Bar for 2015. Credit / Debit cards are welcomed.

Package beer & alcohol are available until 1 AM every night. (Factoid – The Cali Bar has never closed for one single day since it's inception and regardless of weather conditions it is ALWAYS open until 2 AM EVERY night.

There are nightly specials starting at 7 PM every night. Letter dated December 23rd, 2015 by the Creighton University President and Omaha Public Schools Superintendent

Dear Gifford Park Neighborhood Association Members,

The Omaha Public Schools (OPS) and Creighton University are continuing to evaluate the use of property currently owned by Creighton University near the area of 32nd and Webster St. for a proposed new Yates elementary school. Discussions are occurring with officials from both OPS and Creighton, and planning tasks are being identified to advance the feasibility of the concept further. OPS and Creighton University have agreed to coordinate efforts to ensure any related timelines established by OPS are achieved for the design and construction of the new elementary school.

Both Creighton University and the Omaha Public Schools are fully engaged in discussions related to the above referenced site to serve the Gifford Park neighborhood community. OPS officials will lead in this effort with Creighton University providing input and information as needed to consider property options that will meet the physical specifications required in an elementary educational campus setting.
