The Green Space: A Gifford Park Treasure

"Grow With Gifford Park!" Gifford Park has long committed to being a "green neighborhood." We value our mature trees and green spaces, the special harmony that you find in an established neighborhood that has mellowed with the landscape. The GPNA has participated in programs with Big Muddy Workshop and the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum to develop into a showcase green neighborhood. While the appearance of our neighborhood is historic, the people of our diverse community are of today and tomorrow. We support a flourishing Community Garden; Big Muddy Urban Farm; a tree-planting program; and green spaces, especially Gifford Park and the Green Space on 30th Street between Cass Street and Cottage Grove. Gifford Park is our active green for sports and events at the western end of our neighborhood; the Green Space at 30th Street between Cass Street and Cottage Grove is its quiet, contemplative, and natural complement on the other side of the neighborhood.

The Green Space is a beautiful park-like green, ¾ of an acre, home to urban wildlife and songbirds, and cherished for its mature trees—including rare American Elms—that frame a view of the Downtown skyline and give refreshment in summer heat beneath their cooling canopy. There we refresh and recharge in nature, enjoying some green moments on our walks to school or work—or walking our dogs on-leash; there we can stroll, contemplate, meditate, relax, or do tai chi; and children can make lifelong friends with nature—becoming friends of the environment—

And then just a few days ago, in the midst of a muggy Summer day, the news went all over Gifford Park Neighborhood: 'OPS Board members approved the purchase of the parking lot to build the new neighborhood elementary school!' ...

Good news? Certainly! It was one of the objectives of the GPNA this year to get a resolution on the new elementary school. And not only did we get a resolution, we also got what we wanted: build the new elementary school where we think it is best, and save Yates Community Center (Temporarily? We certainly hope not!)

So far, the GPNA has been involved in the discussions leading to these two major decisions. We attended OPS Board meetings and expressed our thoughts and concerns to the Board members, we sent letters to both OPS and Creighton University asking them to start talking with each other, we sent them a petition and we placed signs all around the neighborhood. As for the re-development and transformation of Creighton University Medical Center into apartments and retail spaces, we were invited to preliminary meetings, we shared our vision and wishes, and we felt we were listened to.

We could think our job is done. No! Our job is not done yet! This is just a milestone for Gifford Park Neighborhood: it is a first decision that opens new possibilities, major changes, uncertainties too. It is just the start of a new step, a new era for the neighborhood.

It is important to stay involved in the discussions and decisions about the re-development of Creighton medical Center into apartments and more, and about the school, including its design, its size (fitting the needs), and also the curriculum offered (remember the special meeting last March about the possibility to offer a dual language program). And it is also of paramount importance to be open to new ideas while insisting on what makes our neighborhood: welcoming, inclusive, family-oriented, vibrant, and so much aamore!

Despite, or thanks to, all these changes, Gifford Park Neighborhood is and will remain a great place to live, learn, play and grow!

Eva Swanson Celebrates 90th Birthday

Several years ago, our elderly neighbor Eva Swanson called me over to her house. She was in the midst of moving, having decided it was time to downsize, and she wanted to give me a few of her things. One of them was a beautiful blue and white quilted bedspread, made by her mother. It had a smaller quilt that matched. I admired the workmanship and the pristine condition they were in. "This smaller one was for the crib," she told me. I knew Eva had been an only child and had never married nor had children.

"The crib?" I questioned. "When did a baby live here?"

"I was the baby," answered my 83-year-old neighbor. Standing there in her beautiful, vintage-style house and looking at that baby quilt, I was able to picture her as a little girl growing up, running up and down the stairs, walking to school at Yates Elementary, taking the streetcar to Central High School, leaving for Augustana College in Rockford, IL and returning home to work as a secretary at UNO, a position she held for 41 years. She retired in 1989 and continued to live in the family home, caring for her aging parents there until they passed away in 1991 and 1992. Wow! How many of us can say we've lived our entire lives in one house, one neighborhood, or even one town? Not many.

Although I missed most of Eva's life on Webster St., my family has been fortunate enough to be a part of it for the past 13 years, the first six of which we were neighbors. (Eva moved to Elmwood Towers in 2009.) Every Christmas she invited us over to her house (and now invites us to her apartment) for peppermint ice cream in bowls shaped like tulips, which we eat with her homemade Swedish Christmas cookies and silver spoons. She helped one of my kids learn to sew and knit. They knitted a small blanket and drove together to the Humane Society to present it to a cat. Another one of my children invites Eva every year to her birthday party. Eva is the entire guest list. I could go on with so many wonderful memories of Eva, but then this newsletter would be 25 pages long.

But speaking of birthdays, Eva has just celebrated her 90th! She asked us to come to church with her as part of the celebration, greeting us with, "Today's a great day!" Indeed, reaching the age of 90 does make for a great day, but I think Eva lives every day with this attitude, which may be the reason she is still with us. Last November Eva had triple bypass surgery, which caused her to miss the GPNA holiday banquet for only the second time in 27 years. Her confidence and enthusiasm for life were apparent when she told me, "I'm sorry I'll miss the banquet this year, but I'll be back!"

Happy Birthday, Eva! You are a treasure!


Yates Community Center: A Place for Activies and Meetings



The Green Space: A Gifford Park Treasure

The Green Space has now been incorporated into Omaha's bike trail along 30th Street, providing a peaceful stopover for cyclists, as well as a wraparound alternative route via the well-worn diagonal path through the Green Space. The Green Space continues the green corridor from Turner Park North, and links with Gifford Park's Teen Market Garden site across the street on Cottage Grove. With the forthcoming redevelopment of the Creighton University Medical Center as an apartment complex and the building of a new Gifford Park Elementary School, the role of the Green Space as a "village green" will be more important than ever-- as an amenity to attract new residents to this part of the neighborhood, and for field trips and educational nature visits for schoolchildren attending the new school. Along 30th Street the eastern slope of the Green Space is owned and maintained as green in perpetuity by the City of Omaha as part of the historic and innovative Parks and Boulevards System, designed by the great landscape architect H.W.S. Cleveland. The rest of the Green Space is owned by the Boys Town National Research Hospital, which has maintained and mowed it, planting new trees and preserving the original trees, as a park-like green since the 1970's. Over the years the GPNA has helped protect and preserve the Green Space as green, and it is the neighborhood's hope that, working with Boys Town, we can eventually formalize the role of the Green Space in our community, maintaining it on the model of the Community Garden, or as a city park, or as part of a Community Arboretum in association with the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum.

The Green Space is a microcosm for the global movement to heal the environment and to reconnect with nature, living sustainably. It is a green link in a green chain connecting neighborhoods, parks, and green corridors. Enlightened city planning now values the human scale, takes account of neighborhood impact,

and recognizes that the holistic view promotes a healthy city economy based on flourishing communities. Greenspace, community, and peace of mind are not frills, but necessities.

In protecting the natural urban Green Space, we are part of a nationwide trend in dynamic cities as diverse as New York and Memphis that support parks, pocket parks, green spaces, community gardens, and "privately owned public spaces" in thriving neighborhoods throughout the city.

Be sure to take time to visit and enjoy the Green Space. A few years ago, Tibetan monks from the Gaden Shartse Monastery in India, who have visited Omaha for more than 20 years, performed a beautiful blessing ceremony on the Green Space. The monks will repeat this ceremony when they return in September this year. Come relax on the grass under the trees, and enjoy the peaceful chanting of the monks, the tinkling of bells, and the singing of birds in the Green Space!



Youth Garden Program 2016

At the time of this newsletter we have completed 10 weeks of the Gifford Park Youth Garden (GPYG) program at the Gifford Park Community Garden (35th & Cass St.). The 2016 program is each Saturday morning from 10:00 to 11:30am. This year we again have 44 each 30"x30" raised garden beds that each youth planted and tended since May. To get you caught up with what's been going on, we started May 7 with our Garden Season Opening followed by the next four weeks of learning about plants, selecting which vegetables to grow, then planting their own garden plot and painting name stakes - a



lot of important work gets done during these early weeks. During week 5, the Nebraska Watershed Network had us use 'cell phone microscopes' to view samples (soil, plants, water) using our smart phones, then we had a nature vs. pollution scavenger hunt. Week 6 was 'all hands on deck' as we tended our youth plots by weeding and mulching. For play we created our own 'slip & slide' with a HUGE sheet of plastic, water and a little laundry soap. We also had a water balloon toss and fight to cool off. Week 7 'Art in the Garden I' presenters Brent Lubbert and Monica Lehn taught us all about soil and how to work with clay. Then we made clay pottery which we will fire and paint soon. Week 8 Kate Bodmann and Andrea Lawse taught us about the great variety and health benefits of herbs and other plants. We then toured the community garden to find some of these plants. We are grateful to have Kate and Andrea share their expertise, they both live in Gifford Park, have their own businesses in their expertise field, and sell at the Gifford Park Neighborhood Market on Friday nights. For week 9 Monica Lehn and Mekenzie Sutton led us in 'Garden Movement' activities including yoga and meditation – they are yoga instructors! Kids and adults participated. Week 10 was 'Art in the Garden II' as Anna Deal and Michaela Wolf led us in doing tie-dying of clothing and fabric using different dyes, including natural dyes they made from beets and marigold! Our young gardeners have been growing and harvesting ripening vegetables including squash, cucumbers, radishes, carrots, broccoli, lettuce, tomatoes, watermelons and more. Upcoming sessions include: Art in the Garden III, Cooking Matters, Sound of Music, Making Bread & Butter, and Pizza Garden Harvest PARTY. We cannot thank enough our dedicated volunteers, parents and family members who participate with their young gardeners. The power, inspiration, and responsibility of perseverance

Yes, Gifford Park has great news that spread like wildfire the very second when the vote happened that late at night on July 19. The earlier news itself that Creighton University decided to sell, and now the latest news that the Omaha Public Schools Board voted to buy the land from Creighton for the new neighborhood school are both great, of course. But this is not the entire story. The news means of course that the beloved Yates school stays and so do also stay all of the community outreach programming for refugees and others in need of improving their English and their skills they need to fully join the American dream in our diverse community.

It's been a journey for everyone. It took many meetings, internal and elsewhere with all decision-makers, and letters to higher-ups, and more meetings and more letters. It took speeches and persuasion, it took explaining, partnering, patience, and resilience. It took a strong and sustained community effort, led essentially by Mike Caban, Chris Foster and Martin Janousek and embraced and supported by all. This effort and its most recent success coming with this news is part of a much broader story. In fact it is so broad of a story that we may be afraid to write it in its entirety out of fear that it may madden someone somewhere and it may thus backfire.

The GPNA is now nationally famous for its Adventure Playground. The details were spelled out in the last edition of the newsletter. What does that mean though? The neighborhood has initiatives that are so creative and unique that they are worth recognizing nationally and learned from by everyone nationwide. But wait, there's more. This past month NuStyle, the developer purchasing the site, started working on its early plans for the apartment complex at the now soon-to- be-former Creighton University Medical Center. There were meetings upon meetings. Visioning plans and alternatives were presented and stakeholders were consulted and offered

their input. Martin and Chris were there every step of the way. More than just that, in fact. They took the leadership of the developer on a tour walking around Gifford Park neighborhood. A fly on the wall present at some of those meetings and during the walking-tours told me how often the neighborhood was praised and in how nice terms were its unity, strengths, initiative and care described by all these impressed visitors who are now soon-to- be major new neighbors.

This is the broader scope and context of the latest news. The GPNA voice matters. The designs and strategies chosen incorporate the preferences and philosophy of our neighborhood. The priorities we care for are there. The playing and gathering spaces and the paths between them are there. The existing green space(s) stay and more of them will be added. The overarching green philosophy we care for is embraced and expanded upon by the developer. The small but vibrant Gifford Park business district, Big Muddy, the community garden, and the adjacent park itself are all seen as a strong attraction point to the future residents of the new apartment complex and will enhance the attractiveness of the entire project. Integration is a key feature between Midtown Crossing through and by Gifford Park and NuStyle's new Creighton Lake Center (whichever its name will be) and much beyond up the 30th Street corridor and with the overall bike and green paths of the old "Destination Midtown" project area. This time everything is re-conceptualized and re-assessed with much stronger neighborhood consultation and input.

This is then news not only in architectural design. It is news in cultural endurance and strength. It is news about the power of perseverance and the inspiration that comes from success through perseverance. But it is also a message of warning somewhat. Success is always only temporary and it always calls for more perseverance for more future success... because if one rests on their laurels the turtle may beat the hare in their proverbial race. Here, again, the road is ahead so much more than it is behind.

Adventure Playground Update

Well, we're halfway through our second summer at the Adventure Playground, and it has been a great one so far! We've been really lucky to have had the support of Francisco & FJC Builders early in the spring, when they updated our shed and put in some shelving and pegboard for us. We've been able to organize tools and materials in such a way that things are much more accessible now to youth, and easier for volunteers to track! With the early spring gift from the Sperry's, we now have a good deal of new tools to take care of. It is lovely to be able to store things and find things with ease. In the shed we keep all of the tools and materials that are used on the playground that can't be left outside.



This summer we have also enjoyed the addition of a few new playworker volunteers. Katherine Gillespie went through the playworker training and has been at the playground almost every week since the start of summer. She works at Film Streams, and brings along with her a big bag of popcorn saved from the night before at the theatre. The kids love digging into popcorn in the afternoon, and often use it as a prop for their play. In the first official day at the AP this summer, the youth invented a play, in which popcorn was a central prop. They pretended it was gold, and the plot formed around that idea.

Another new volunteer, Katie Schroeder & her son, Cole had his birthday party at the Playground before summer began. We have been lucky enough to have her commitment to being at the playground in the afternoons most of the summer. We'll be sad to see her and Cole head off to Minnesota this August, but will eagerly welcome them back next year!

The youth at the playground have been getting super creative this summer especially with regards to creating solutions for dangling while in the treehouse. An apparatus of ropes has risen and fallen, as well as a hammock and a tire swing. Stop in sometime to see what is currently keeping people hanging around! And while you're there, you can stop in for some lessons in target practice using bow and arrow, which is a favorite tool to create while at the playground. Longtime volunteer, Monica Lehn and her son Ezra have really worked to hone in on the perfect solution to making PVC bows.

The playground is open on Saturdays from 2-6 PM, but families are welcome to stop in and use the space any time it is light enough to see! What is yet to come, and how one can and should use this gained strength of voice that is heard to its fullest potential, are the realnews here.

The fly on the wall I mentioned above told me about this vision of coffee shops and attorney offices on California St. between 30th St. and 33rd St. Just as an example of a broader vision. I never figured out why attorney offices. I guess it is because many attorneys from downtown already come often to California Tacos. I have nothing against all that. Coffee shops across the street from the school may support creativity and a spirit of entrepreneurship. They may inspire the young to apprentice while in school and to dream at starting their own business. Besides, I like hip places and hip places attract people and increase property values. As long as it is done right, as long as all neighbors respect each other and listen to each other, and as long as the dreams are fearless and their implementation is pursued with perseverance, such visions can only lend good results.

The good news is thus that there is always more good news to come when passionate people set their minds together at predicting the future by building it themselves, one good idea at a time, and one inspiring neighborhood project upon neighborhood project at a time. The power of creativity coming from an inclusive culture is generally hard to see in the immediate. It's usually showing over long periods of time. Just as the power of perseverance.

Let us all keep our focus on working even harder into the future inspiring each other and inspiring others who are watching us with the strength and responsibility of the success of this long lasting perseverance that got us here and will take us as far as the soul and heart can dream.
