Give Your Input on Hospital Redevelopment at General Meeting By Martin Janousek

What's happening with the old Saint Joe's (a.k.a Creighton University Medical Center, Alegent, CHI hospital? That's a frequent question members of the Gifford Park Neighborhood Association Board get when out and about in the neighborhood. Over the past year, it was announced that Creighton University would be selling the hospital and surrounding property. Prior to this, the GPNA was already working to secure land for a new school after hearing on the street that a sale of Creighton land was possible. Then this spring, it was announced that NuStyle, a local developer, would be purchasing the property. Over the summer, representatives from the board were invited to participate in a 3 day Charrette (Brainstorming) exercise from NuStyle and got an early look at what might take place with the hospital.

Well, come November 10th at 7:00 pm in the Morrison Seminar room on the first floor of the hospital you'll have a chance to be one of the first to see plans of what our newest neighbor, NuStyle Development plans to do with the hospital, surrounding parking lots and site. Todd Heistand of NuStyle will be presenting their plans and answering neighbors questions. This is a great opportunity for all of us to meet Todd and for him to meet you. We'll have a chance to learn more about this large project and how it will impact our neighborhood.

That same evening right after NuStyle does their presentation, we will also hear what the plans are for our BRT (Bus Rapid Transit) route. Representatives will be showing the route and explaining how it will work. Bring your questions, this should be a very informative and fun evening.

20"/16mm Bike Build-a-Thon By Adam Blowers

Our mission is to improve Omaha neighborhoods by promoting the bicycle as a safe, viable, and lowcost form of transportation. One of the ways we accomplish this is by getting as many bicycles distributed as we can. Last year we got over 500 bikes overhauled and back on the road, this year we aim to surpass that goal. However, we've got some work to do and we need some help. So from November 9th to December 10th we are hosting a Bike Build-a-Thon. We are trying to overhaul 100 bikes (that's about 2,500 lbs of Bikes!) that will be donated to other local non-profits just in time for the holiday season and we are seeking volunteers to help. If you're new to bike mechanics, consider stopping by for an hour or two during Open Shop and help us refurbish a bike for donation. If you're an experienced wrench, you can "foster" a bike (or 2 or 3!) from the shop, fix it at home, and return it on or before December 10th. On the 10th from 12PM to 6PM we'll be working against the clock to finish any last minute bikes, so join us for some fast and hectic bike building fun. We will end our bike-raiser campaign with a final weighing and tally of the refurbished bikes. On December 16th we will have a end of campaign celebration where awards will be given to the individual mechanics, shops, and teams who fix up the most bikes (by weight!). National elections come and go, neighbors and neighborhoods stay. Forever.

Every four years there is a spike in voter participation. It is a well-known and guite well researched fact. In these United States everyone is on average so much more interested in presidential elections than in any other elections, be it for House of Representatives or the Senate, or be it for local and state elected officials. This is of course simply silly, because so much more depends on local and state officials and what they decide than how we are impacted here locally by what the President of the United States decides, whoever she or he may be. It is true nonetheless.

As I write these lines we are at that time in November of every forth year. We don't know who will win the election for president of the United States yet. By the time this would be read we might know though. I will submit that in spite of all the hype who wins the presidential election doesn't really matter, after all. It does matter, of course. Thus vote. Get well informed and vote. Yet, it doesn't matter who wins in the presidential election as much as it matters who wins in every other election than that one.

A simple matter of perspective

In the United States there are over 89,000 local governments. Inside these, in places such as Omaha organization is further distributed at neighborhood level. We can probably safely assume that there must be 1,500,000 neighborhoods or their equivalent in the United States. Gifford Park is one of these many. Ours. One of the best nationwide.

We all too often forget the very core beauty of American democracy—the experimenting nature and beauty of federalism. Most decisions are taken locally. Most things that matter to us on a day-by-day basis are decided locally, and not in Washington D.C. Not even in Lincoln as much as they would like it to. In Omaha instead.

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Washington DC decides (or not at all). Property taxes and cost of a building permit affect us more as well. All these other following things matter more and more often: responsiveness of OPPD when one lists a broken street lamp, the Mayor's hotline response time, and the effectiveness of the city contractors' in collecting the garbage or filling in pot holes, or organizing large-size waste collection, or it will be all about removing snow very soon...

What gets developed in the neighborhood and how will it be done matters. NuStyle Development consulting us all in their planning for the old Creighton University Medical Center matters. Saving Yates Community Center matters. The place where and how the neighborhood school will be built matters to us more still.

As we approach winter, we are coming away from summer and we finally see some autumn weather, With Halloween just behind us and with Thanksgiving ahead, and new year soon to come after that, it is that time of the year when neighborhood elections just knock at the door. That time of this year, as of every year and not just of every forth year, when we can take a step back and take stock.

The grass is greener... on the side that you water

To get engaged in what happens in politics is all too often and for all too many an every four-years thing. Every four years (OK, every two years after all, but more so every four years) the lawns are filled with campaign signs, and the airwaves get all too full of campaign ads. The radio and TV stations ads revenue budget must go through the roof. Campaign ads become like pumpkin spice. Elections spirit is just everywhere. Chevrolet dealerships run election themed ads just to be in sync with the trend. The beer companies mock campaign ads making their own "party" as well. Every candidate is first better than his or her opponents. As election day comes nearer, then every opponent becomes so much nastier than the candidate paying for the ad, or who is promoted by the super Political Action Committee

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Gifford Park Neighborhood School/Save Yates Effort Update

Here's an update on Omaha Public Schools (OPS) plans for our new neighborhood elementary school on the parking lot property near 32nd & Webster. On Thursday October 20, several of us neighborhood representatives met with Omaha Public School (OPS) officials to discuss in some detail the new school planning & design process overview and timeline, our community role, and determine if we (the community) should have our own separate "planning design" meeting in the coming weeks. We felt we do not need to have our own meeting, and instead focus our community efforts on the OPS-led upcoming community meetings in January. Here are some other items discussed:

-We will identify 3-5 community representatives (must be committed & passionate) to be on the Educational Specification (ED Spec) committee.

-The Educational Specification (ED Spec) committee will also include 2 principals for a total of 6-8 people.

-Ed Spec committee will meet every week during January-February, then less often after that -Other "teacher specialists" (IT, PE, Math, Nutritionist, etc.) will rotate in.

-A large community meeting will occur in the beginning (2nd or 3rd week in January) to describe the process, the Ed Spec committee, and community input opportunities...And there will be a community meeting later in the process to ensure transparency and hopefully buy-in. We will get out the word to appropriate neighborhoods (fliers, newsletter, email, social media, meetings, events, Kellom Elementary, etc.) to promote these community meetings.

-School capacity plans to be about 450 (could change a bit depending on attendance boundaries, programming, curriculum).

-Final outcome will be a published narrative with areas of focus, etc. and will go before OPS Board for approval.

-Important factors will be to keep an open mind about potential school functions, flexible & future uses, technology, instructional models, urban school design, etc.

-Yates Community Center building and programming will continue as it currently functions.

Current OPS planned schedule for new Gifford Park neighborhood elementary school is: Jan. 2017-Sept. 2017 – building design Oct. 2017-Dec. 2017 – construction procurement Jan. 2018-July 2019 – construction Aug. 2019 – move in



We look forward to partnering with OPS to design the best school possible from all angles – physical design (building footprint and urban design & architecture to fit in with our neighborhood); safety; walk/bicycle routes; car/bus/transportation traffic routes & parking; curriculum/programming (i.e. potential magnet for dual language, STEM, STEAM, agriculture, economics, other magnet focus); student assignment plan for the new school attendance boundaries; PTA/PTO; principal selection; proper technology & resources; etc. We will inform everyone of upcoming opportunities to provide community input – stay tuned!

Dear Curtis,


