New Tools for New Challenges (Home Sales & Increased Development)

Over the past few years, the GPNA Board has been wrestling with how to address some of the mixed blessings that come from Gifford Park (and Midtown in general) being seen more and more as a place worth investing in. We're now working on two tools that we think will help. The first is using Nextdoor to help people who want to buy a home to live in Gifford Park. The second is creating what we're calling a "code of conduct" to help real estate developers (and property managers too) understand how they can be a good neighbor.

Here's a little background on why we're taking these steps. For home sales, more and more we've been hearing stories about people (including some Board members) who have been looking to buy a home in Gifford Park because they love the neighborhood and want to live here, but they've been unable to do so because investors keep buying the properties as soon as they go on the market. As a neighborhood association, we want Gifford Park to be a place where families who want to live in the neighborhood can find a way to buy a home here.

If you are considering selling your home (or you know someone else who is), please use Nextdoor Gifford Park to connect with people who want to live in Gifford Park before putting it on the market.

On the code of conduct side, the Board has frequently been involved with trying to ensure that new real estate development projects are compatible with our neighborhood. Unfortunately, this is often done on an ad hoc basis. What we're proposing is to develop written guidelines to help developers understand the identity and values of this Gifford Park. Our goal is to be less reactive to new development and instead have

Yates Education Community Partnership (ECP) Update By Susan Mayberger

The programming at Yates ECP programming continues to meet the needs of our newly arriving families and our youngest children. During the 2016-17 school year, Yates provided conversational English classes and parenting classes to over 600 parents. Classes are offered every day that the Omaha Public Schools' elementary schools are in session. Classes are from 9:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. One of the most popular classes are for migrant and refugee parents with young children. Sometimes, there are more 40 moms and their children learning their ABCs and 1-2-3 in English. The families are from Burma, Bhutan, Nepal, the Congo, Syria, Somalia, Mexico and other countries. Learning English is critical for our newly arriving families that live in our neighborhood.


On Tuesdays and Thursdays, sewing classes are provided. The parents have learned to sew hats, gloves and scarves to give the newly arriving families. There are cultural orientation classes on Fridays. On Saturdays, students from Creighton University are providing free citizenship classes at Yates.

In addition to the programs for immigrants and refugees, there are four classes for Early Childhood. Their end of the year program will be on Friday, May 26th at 2:30 p.m. All of the Gifford Park Neighborhood is invited to wish our 4 year olds well as they move on to kindergarten in the new school year.

On Saturday April 15 (immediately following the Easter Egg Hunt) the Gifford Park neighborhood celebrated the 5-year anniversary of our playground equipment because of the great efforts of the Operation Playground project lead by Maria Devlin. It was our (the Gifford Park Neighborhood Association) privilege to honor Maria and her family at the playground for their tremendous efforts!

A bit of history, back in about 2010, a group of Creighton University Occupational Therapy (OT) students came to the Gifford Park Neighborhood Association to see if they could do something that would impact the neighborhood. As students in the College of Pharmacy and Health Professions, the health of people in the community, especially children, was important to them. Maria lead the group in its efforts to raise over \$50,000 from special fundraising dinners, on-campus events, local foundations and in-kind donations.

Since the playground equipment installation 5 years ago, Maria's family meet back to Omaha each spring and fall to organize a playground & park cleanup celebration (complete with healthy food for volunteers!). Maria and husband Rory live in Denver, CO and Maria's parents George & Patty Doyle live in Columbus, OH. One example of this spirit is the Full Cycle Supper, a collaborative fundraiser hosted by Big Muddy Urban Farm and Community Bike Project Omaha.

The Full Cycle Supper is a progressive five-course, farm fresh meal. The meal consists of riding your bike to the various Big Muddy Urban Farm plots enjoying a unique course at each plot. The 3-mile bike ride will take place on Sunday, June 25th at 5 p.m. Talented local chefs from the area will prepare the courses to feature ingredients grown where their course is served.

The ride will start with the first course at Big Muddy's 33rd and California St. plot. Tickets are \$45 for the meal and tour assistance. A couple of our awesome volunteers have organized a weekly distance ride series that is designed to help beginners build up to riding longer distances and get them comfortable riding in groups. If you've ever wanted to ride some of the summer charity rides but are worried if you can keep up or not, then these rides are for you. They are no drop casual rides. The first one has already happened and was 10 miles, but the next ride is Saturday May 13th at 9 a.m. and the rest will happen every Saturday after. Meet at the shop by 8:45am and leave at 9am.
