Kim Jones is Named Principal of New School

Experienced educator, Kim Jones, was named as the principal of the new school in the Gifford Park neighborhood. The announcement came a few days after the community meeting held on September 10th at Yates.

Ms. Jones was born in Olathe, Kansas. She was one of four children and her parents, while they didn't go to college, always stressed the importance of education. Her 93 year old mother still lives in the house, where she grew up. She. graduated from Kansas State in 1984 and then went to work for the Olathe school district. She taught 3rd grade and sixth grade. She then moved to Billings, Montana and took the next six years off to stay at home with her four children. The family

later moved to the Washington DC area and she worked in a nearby school district. In 2001, the family moved to Omaha and she started her career with the Omaha Public Schools. She taught at both Fullerton Elementary and Buffett Middle schools before moving to an Elementary Supervisor position based at the TAC building. As an Elementary Supervisor, she worked with principals in 14 different schools, trained teachers and worked on curriculum in the areas of social studies and math.

A Nation and a World of Neighbors

This last week on Friday, September 28th, the Gifford Park Neighborhood Market closed for the season. The weather was a bit gray, and the darkness of the evening was already coming much earlier than over summer. We could barely see anything anymore. Luckily we had a flashlight on us. We could use it to see what we were buying.

This particular market was special for us. Every neighborhood market is special, but this one was a little bit more special for us than the others. This past weekend we celebrated five years since the day when we have actually moved into our home in Gifford Park. It feels as if we've always lived in our house, so thanks goes to social media for reminding us how five years ago we were mudding and painting the living room and scrubbing and cleaning everything, and carrying water from neighbors in a pail and using the toilet at the gas station, while we set up a camping table in the dining room and had an "elaborate" breakfast anyway, with a table cloth on the table and our camping plates. Odd... the house doesn't seem to have been ready yet, but we moved in anyway... We thus bought some celebratory things at this last market. This past weekend a neighbor called my phone. My Dear Bride and I were just parking the car in front of the house so I saw the call on the screen. A fine neighbor was asking for me by name. As I answered it turns out she had called Chris Foster first and since there was no answer she was calling me next. Being on speakerphone in the car my Dear Bride Marie Hélène and I listened to her together. Marie Hélène had her own input, much more important and useful than mine. In 2012, Ms. Jones was named principal at Sherman Elementary School. While at Sherman, she worked to create many community partnerships. The school started an after school program and raised achievement significantly in all content areas. Sherman had a large number of English Language Learners and this was something that she loved about that school. In 2016, she moved to Minne Lusa Elementary School. While at Minne Lusa, she also worked to develop community partnerships, on establishing procedures and routines and increasing student engagement. Student achievement has also increased under her tenure at Minne Lusa.

This year when the posting came for the new school in the Gifford Park neighborhood, Ms. Jones applied immediately because she said, "how exciting is it to open a new school and I had heard so much about the community". She is excited about working with the diversity and with such an active neighborhood association.

Ms. Jones describes herself as a "people person, with a strong work ethic." She is excited about coming to work every Monday and she will do anything for the students. She said that her students "in many ways, are like her family." She is knowledgeable about best instructional practices and will work to hire a teaching staff that will put students first.



Her goals for the new school are to have the school be a place where all of the students and teachers want to be. A school that has high achievement, a high level of community involvement and a reputation of doing whatever it takes to meet the needs of the students. In five years, she will know that she has been successful if the school grows in size and diversity, by the amount of community partnerships and involvement, if the school has a high level of achievement and strong procedures and routines in place. She hopes that her legacy is that she will be remembered by her students.

Her greatest professional achievement has been her work as a principal. It had never even crossed her mind in earlier years that this would be her path but she loves her work. On personal level, she talked about the achievement of raising her family. She has three sons and a daughter and three granddaughters. One son and his family live in Phoenix but the rest of the family lives in Omaha.

Ms. Jones said that a letter is going out to all of the families with school age children that live in the attendance area inviting them to attend a meeting on Tuesday, October 16 from 6-8 p.m. in the TAC auditorium (3215 Coming Street). There will be representatives from the OPS Placement and Research offices. It will be the start of the discussion on the name of the school, the school colors and mascot. She hopes that people will come out to be part of the discussion.

as soon as she moved into the neighborhood she paid the Gifford Park Neighborhood Association membership. She was explaining this with much pride. It reminded me of how I went to my first GPNA meeting in September of 2013 and how we paid the neighborhood association membership right away as well, even before we had even moved into our house five years ago. I liked the pride in our neighbor's voice. She exuded happiness and responsibility to be here and a lot of care to make things better around herself for herself and for everyone else's benefit as well. I was very glad she called and was pleasantly surprised that somehow she chose me right after our neighborhood cowboy, Chris. I don't have any formal position so I still wonder why. We're glad we could help at least a little. It's what neighbors are always for. Here, there, and everywhere. During our travels to Saint Louis MO in the last few years we learned that in 1835 in a small village in Missouri named Florida MO a child was born. In his own words expressed later, "Missouri was a new state at that time and it needed attractions. This is why my parents postponed me until we got to Missouri." He grew up mostly in another small village on the Mississippi named Hannibal MO. Some 40+ years later he published a book written in part about his days as a teenager in that small town of Hannibal MO on the Mississippi in the early 1850s.

Half a world away and a century and more later, in 1975, a young boy jumped through a window to enter from the outside his fourth grade classroom in Bucharest Romania. It wouldn't be the first or the last window he'd jump through. To get in or to get out, with all of those instances not exactly in accordance to the rules. But this one time was special. His teacher saw him and asked the boy's best friend to make a cartoon of the boy jumping the window. The friend did so. Maybe it helped that the friend's mother was a respected English teacher at a reputed high school nearby. Who knows. Between the friend, the friend's mother, the boy's parents and the teacher they all shamed the young boy by displaying the cartoon for an entire month on the school's notice board.

Another forty years later, in 2015, that same young boy, now a father living in Gifford Park in Omaha Nebraska, visited Hannibal MO with his teenage daughter. And they all whitewashed the fence Tom Sawyer's aunt apparently asked young Tom to whitewash and he decided to make it into a small business asking everyone to pay him for the pleasure of being allowed to whitewash a portion of the fence.

This father was very proud that his teenage girl had read the book starting as early as at four years of age. Silly father. Little did he know that he was planting the window-jumping microbe into the little girl's mind, just as he had learned it from the book and then applied it himself, whether at home or at school.

This summer the now half of a life aged father went to the waterslides in Gifford Park out of curiosity, hand in hand with the Vice-President of the GPNA, his Dear Bride Marie Hélène. Seeing all the children slide down over and over again, and encouraged by Brittney Rubek and others who were manning the water station, to say nothing about Chris's own hints, it didn't take long Continued on page 8

before we were also sliding down and running back up hill and sliding down again full of mud, and again, and again...

Where else than in Gifford Park can someone have so much fun? At the market we bought two elephants made in support of wildlife and lemurs in particular in Madagascar. Marie Hélène loves elephants. She was born among them after all. We have a houseful of elephants but these two ones will always be special. To get them we used a coupon my Dear Bride got as a gift for her service as President of the GPNA last year and the year before that. Thank you, Gifford Park neighbors! Yet, they support wildlife in Madagascar... Ideas and values don't ever have borders. Just as the book Mark Twain wrote could not be blocked by the regime in communist Romania from getting into the hearts and minds of the young in Romania, no matter how hard the regime was trying in the 1970s and 1980s to block the West from influencing the minds of free thinking Romanian children. Seemingly culture and books in general and about childhood in particular cross over the harshest borders under the hardest conditions.
