### **Updates on 32nd and Burt Elementary School**

Have you had the opportunity to drive by the new school site located at 32nd and Burt Street? Progress is being made every day on the new elementary school located at 32nd and Burt, and is scheduled to be ready to occupy mid to late June of 2019. Letters went out to future students who reside within the new school's boundaries in October through U.S. Mail. Community meetings have been held during October at the TAC building and at Yates Center to receive input on the school name, school mascot and school colors. A committee is being formed, which is made up of future

32nd and Burt Street School students, parents, district representatives, and community members with the selection for the school name, colors, and mascot being finalized by mid-January. Ms. Kimberly Jones, newly appointed Principal of the new school at 32nd and Burt Street School. shared the district protocol/process of selecting a school name, mascot, and school colors with families and community members in attendance at the meetings. Student Placement shared the process for students who will be assigned to the new school, and school selection options, and Jeramie Cobb, Jacobs representative, shared the plans and progress being made on the new school.



Within the next few months grants will be written for playground equipment, concrete will be laid on the site, and the building brick will be completed. The building is being secured and enclosed for work that will occur through the winter months, and it is starting to take shape! Ms. Jones completes walk throughs weekly of the new school, and takes pictures to upload to Facebook to keep the public informed of the progress. Staffing will begin after the first of the year, as well as ordering of furniture and instructional materials. Updates will be provided through newsletters and social media. The excitement felt in the community and district level interest and support has been overwhelmingly positive! Good things are ahead for our school community!

## **New Bike Share Station in the Neighborhood**

Gifford Park is excited to welcome Heartland B-cycle to our neighborhood! The station is located on the northeast corner of 33rd & California Streets just west of Selena's Market and comes online Wednesday November 21st.

Heartland B-cycle is the first large-scale municipal bike sharing system in the Omaha metro area operated by Heartland Bike Share. Bike sharing makes it economical and convenient to use bikes for trips that are too far to walk but too short to drive. As a member or using a FUN! pass, you can use a B-cycle to run an errand, grab lunch, travel from the bus stop to your office, or just get some fresh air.



We are so excited that our neighborhood is included in Heartland Bike Share's expansion, and we hope you'll join us on November 21st at 4:30pm for the first 'Ceremonial Check Out'. You can hear more at this ceremony from GPNA President Eliza Perry, Community Bike Shop Director Adam

Blowers, and Heartland Bike Share Executive Director Ben Turner about how this station is part of a network of solutions to help you use active transportation in our city.

The bikes are readily adjustable for people short & tall, equipped with baskets to carry your goods, and lights to keep you safe! The bike has a built-in lock, and it has three speeds to make climbing our neighborhood's hills easy...well, easier.

Memberships are available on a monthly or annual basis and include unlimited 1 hour rides at all metro locations. Or you can try it out with a \$6 FUN! pass for unlimited 1 hour rides for 24 hours! Use the B-Cycle app or the station kiosk to buy your FUN! pass and get riding. You can check out bikes at any of the 70 stations in the metro area! Members can purchase and use their Heartland Pass card or the B-cycle app to check out bikes.

## What kind of design do you want to see around the bus stops on Dodge? Let's talk TOD.

This impacts our neighborhood, and we have a voice. The city wants to hear our voices. Nothing is decided yet, but the city wants to finalize plans in July for what the space around the new rapid transit bus stops will look like along Dodge. How will this fit into our vital neighborhood? Will houses be torn down? Will new ones be built? Will this housing be affordable? What can we do to make the streets around the bus stop walkable, pleasant, attractive, pedestrian-friendly? What kind of design do we want to see? These are all questions that the city is asking us. Come and make your voice heard. You can speak up or write out your thoughts. There will be neighborhood meetings organized by the city in the later part of the winter. We had one in mid-November too. Stay tuned for updates.

The name of this initiative is transit oriented development aka TOD. Google it. The City of Omaha and Metro Transit are building a rapid transit bus along Dodge from Westroads to downtown. This is called Omaha Rapid Bus Transit or ORBT for short. This should attract people, and to make it more attractive the city needs to update its Master Plan to allow for old stuff, new stuff, and good stuff around these bus stops. #### Golden Grocery Opens at 33rd & Cass St

Mukhtar Omar (he says just call him "Omar") is very excited to open his new business "Golden Grocery" at 33rd & Cass (site of the old gas station). He is getting to know the business district and other areas of our neighborhood. In fact, Omar, his wife and children recently took a tour of the community garden and Adventure Playground – they love the chickens and climbing to the second story of the tree house! He and his family, originally from Somalia, Africa, currently live just northwest of our neighborhood. Golden Grocery just opened November 12. Over the next few weeks, they plan to finish stocking their shelves with a variety of both grocery and convenience items. Besides many grocery item staples like cereal, flour, grains, rice, beans, lentils, canned vegetables, sesame and other oils, ketchup, milk, honey, fruit juices, etc., they also sell organic products, corn grits, chicken, cumin seeds, adzuki beans, mixed tea spices, dates, ginger/cardamom/cinnamon mix, ethnic and imported products, and hot sambuusa (a fried savory pastry).



Some of his products, he said, can't be found at any other store in Omaha. They will sell tobacco products, but no alcohol. Omar says initial business hours are 9am-7pm every day, and he plans to expand hours and put up signage soon. Omar and his family invite the neighborhood to stop in and say hello and check out the store. We wish Omar good luck and welcome to Gifford Park!

#### **High School Juniors Support Students at Yates**

High school juniors in the Grassroots Leadership Development Program (GLDP) spent a day at Yates in early October as part of their community service project. The students have been studying school, city and county government. This program encourages student leadership and civic engagement. The students are asked to think about how they can positively impact their community. Approximately 150 students have been participating in this program on Tuesday evenings this fall. The community service project is to put into action what they have learned about how students can positively impact their community.

Fourteen of the GLDP students chose to go to Yates on Oct. 12th. The students spent the morning working in the Pre-K classrooms. Over lunch, they had a presentation from the League of Women

Voters about how to register to vote. In the afternoon, the students set up a Children's Carnival for the Pre-K students and their families. The GLDP students were responsible for planning the activities. Over 50 Pre-K students and their families had the opportunity to finger paint, pin the nose on the jack-o-lantern, go through a tricycle obstacle course and throw bean bags on to a target.

In addition to doing community service at Yates, some GLDP students are working with Habitat for Humanity, working in a homeless shelter and going into middle schools with the presentation "How to Be Successful in High School." The GLDP students who successfully complete all components of the program are eligible to attend the United States Hispanic Leadership Program in Chicago in February.



#### 10th Annual Bike De'Lights Ride

Break out your battery-powered string lights, gloves, and balaclavas! It's that time of year to decorate your bike and ride around midtown Omaha to see the holiday lights with friends!

The 10th Annual Bike De'Lights, a social ride at a casual/conversational pace hosted by Bike Walk Omaha (formerly Omaha Bikes), enjoying viewing holiday decorated homes and displaying festively decorated bicycles. Participants are encouraged to layer in warm clothes. For your safety, lights and bicycle helmets are required. This is a nighttime ride on public streets. Nebraska law requires you to have a white front light and a red rear reflector when riding after dark. In addition, a red tail light and light/reflective clothing strongly recommended! (And highly luminescent, over the top holiday decor will be rewarded) You are riding and at your own risk and will be required to sign a liability waiver to participate.

The route will begin and end at Burnzzz Burgers, Wings & Games and be about 5 miles long on a combination of bike trails and open, public streets. We are incredibly thankful for the community we grow in. Thanks for supporting Big Muddy at the second annual Let's Grow Here Gala held on November 2nd! We will continue to provide accessible educational opportunities in urban agriculture because of you! Together we raised \$15,700!

The evening showcased a full display of local talent and local agriculture. We all came together to break bread, enjoying a meal together that was crafted by the magnificently talented chefs at Creighton Dining Services, Monarch Prime & Bar, Kitchen Table, and Grainolia. The food was so good and the turnout was beyond belief that we started to run out of food. Thanks to the miracle maker chef Kevin Newlin at CU and Matthew Cronin for helping make sure everyone had a dish to enjoy! Food was created with local ingredients provided by local farms Common Good Farm, In Season, City Sprouts, ELTEE Mangalitsa's LLC Gourmet Pork, Plum Creek Farms, Small Starts, Big Muddy Urban Farm, Doc's Holiday Healthy Farms, and AJ Farms.

Paired with the food was delicious local craft brew by Pint Nine Brewing Co., Kros Strain Brewing Company, Upstream Brewing Company, and Benson Brewery. There are many savvy brewers in our community, thank you for the support!

The evenings program began with a new rendition of hot potato ~ hot sauce! Attendees won Crazy Gringa Hot Sauce if they had the bottle of hot sauce when tunetastic musicians Adam Sherrerd and Anna Selmecki stopped playing. Hot Sauce was made using Scotch Bonnet peppers grown by Big Muddy Aspiring Farmer Residents.

We explored the work of local filmmakers Karalee Padilla and Lynn Sanchez as they showed a short clip of their documentary "Love Letters from the Resistance" about women in agriculture in the Nebraska/lowa food shed.


