Yates Community Center is at 3260 Davenport St. The City of Omaha is hosting another meeting in our neighborhood, and we have a voice. The city wants to hear our voices. Nothing is decided yet, but the city wants to finalize plans in July for what the space around the new rapid transit bus stops will look like along Dodge. How will this fit into our vital neighborhood? Will houses be torn down? Will new ones be built? Will this housing be affordable? What can we do to make the streets around the bus stops walkable, pleasant, attractive, pedestrian-friendly? What kind of design do we want to see? These are all questions that the city is asking us. Come and make your voice heard. You can speak up or write out your thoughts. This is the second meeting that the city has posted in our neighborhood. The first one was Feb 7. The new Gifford Park Elementary School is coming along nicely and construction is running right on time! Classroom teachers are in place for our August, 2019 opening! Playground equipment has been selected and grants have been submitted to Sherwood Foundation to cover the costs of the playground. Administration is anxiously awaiting an answer regarding funding for our playground equipment. Once this

happens installation scheduling will be the next step. Kids Club has been finalized and will be in place for our 2019-2020 school year. Weekly tours through the building by administration are exciting! All furniture and supplies have been ordered. Cabinets have been installed. Electricity is working inside of the building. Painting is underway and building colors are present on bathroom walls and desk and cabinet areas. Ms. Jones has transitioned from Minne Lusa Elementary and is working from the TAC building until occupancy of the building is ready. Teambuilding days will occur for staff in late July. Gifford Park PTO is underway and is working to plan many partnerships with community members and businesses.

Gifford Park Elementary Bike Parking

We need your help! Upon reviewing plans for the new Gifford Park Elementary School, I discovered that we can improve the accessibility of bicycle parking for our neighborhood students. We are working to raise \$2000 to install the best bicycle parking and raise funds to provide Safe Routes to School for our GPE students.

Omaha Public Schools' standard policy uses a 'Wave' bicycle rack that is very difficult to use for elementary age children. They need to lift up their bike to secure it to the rack, and the current space allocated for bicycle parking can be better configured with 'inverted u' racks. OPS has agreed to install the improved parking racks if we can fundraise that difference in cost. Walking and biking to school is a fantastic way to keep our kiddos healthy!

Park Clean Up Saturday, April 13 // 10am - noon Gifford Park (33rd and Cass St.)



Restore Nebraska - 14th Year

March 1 & 2 marked the 14th year for the Restore Nebraska (formerly Restore Omaha) Conference. Restoration Exchange Omaha and History Nebraska presented a hands-on interactive and educational conference held at the historic Fort Omaha/Metro Community College campus. The snowy weather kept attendance down a bit, but the conference included 18 workshops to restore, revive, and preserve great older homes, buildings, and neighborhoods. Highlights and workshops included: keynote Daniel Carey from Historic Savanah Foundation; historical brewery tour; how to buy, finance, and restore older buildings; repairing old windows and plaster; paint for historic buildings; masonry tips and tricks; reception at the soon-to-be-restored Benson Theater: book sale; Restore Jam with before and after project photos. Contractors have begun grading and landscape work at a Big Muddy Urban Farm plot near 34th and Burt St.

Plans for the Burt St. Plot are to host a hoop house, fruit production, perennial production, and a 35'x35' space designated for annual vegetable production/cover crops. All while trying to find the middle ground of providing an educational, demonstration site that community can stop by and learn from, while also maintaining an easy work flow for resident farmers to bring products to market.

Pomology students at Metro Community College are partnering on the project to come up with designs for an urban orchard on the lot. Pomology is the science of growing fruit. Big Muddy is always open to ideas on this renovation and plan to plant fruit trees later this Fall. It's great to connect the classroom to real world scenarios. It is a benefit to all.







Whatever Magic

A long time ago (but not that long) there was a summer snow storm. Not biting and cold, but warm and soft, made up of hi(n)xpe (seeds) from the ma'a to(n)ga (cottonwood trees). One hi(n)xpe, possibly from an ancient mother over the ridge (we now call 38th St.) in the next stream bed (we call Saddle Creek) got caught in the mud of a small draw. There it stuck, was rained on and sprouted. It grew among brothers and sisters and for over 200 years it stretched tall and wide.

Its own hi(n)xpe may have been gathered by people of the Umo(n)ho(n) tribe for bedding and its roots harvested to make simple hand drill sets, fire. Eventually different people (that looked more like me) came and some of its brothers and sisters flesh was hacked into, burned for warmth. As muddy tracks were laid-over with brick and then later concrete only seven ma'a to(n)ga were left among the reeds and grasses.

Many years later as the lilacs bloomed a great summer storm swept over the hill. Feeling the pull of the wind and the lashing of the rain it decided to let go of one of its branches instead of bowing completely to the will of the storm. This learned evolutionary advantage, losing a limb instead of a whole body, is so common in cottonwoods that many cities have enshrined laws into their city code banning them from being planted. This branch crashed into a barren dead space (what we call a parking lot) and destroyed three cars. The next day city workers quickly came, removed the branch and toppled this tree to the ground. They hewed its flesh and left one more stump in the small draw (in what we call Gifford Park). Finding the aftermath a night later, I stood on its stump and screamed curses into the dark.

The previous spring my kids and I had made fairy houses at the base of its trunk, inviting whatever magic that is left in this world to feel at home there. Of the seven ma'a to(n)ga that were growing in the park when I was born only four remain.

This is only one telling of this story, the trees have their own, and the native people of this land have theirs as well. Those are stories worth knowing, as much as this one and maybe even more so. But I think this story is important in its own right. As our neighborhood asks collective questions about change, who is welcome here and what we want to see, there seems to be a lesson or maybe a question to be learned or asked. What does it mean to belong? Who and what are included in that sense of 'we,' that is so often invoked? Will my children be able to find a ma'a to(n)ga sprouting, watch it grow as they do? Will the summer snow storms grow smaller and smaller as the final siblings of this tree fall?

This spring we will plant a ma'a to(n)ga in its place, inviting whatever magic is still left in this world to have a home there.

I would like to remember, in words, that this land still belongs to the Umo(n)ho(n) people (physically as well as spiritually) and thank my teacher Glenna Slater for the permission to share some of her language in this reflection.

with Gifford Park Neighborhood Market's new designation as an official "Farmer's Market". For the first time, GPNM has been required to purchase a "Farmer's Market Umbrella Permit" for \$413 from the Douglas County Health Department which in the past we only had to have a City of Omaha's "Peddlers Permit". This new designation and permit will now cover up to 25 vendors who can sell fresh, uncut produce at our market.

The change is bittersweet for us who put on this volunteer-run market. This new cost burden and additional regulations will not hold the Gifford Park Neighborhood Market Management Team back from continuing to put on this wonderful summer event, which



is entering it's 12th year. Rest assured, the wonderful atmosphere and sense of community will continue and our place as the neighborhoods "Living Room"

will be even better every Friday evening this summer.

If you know anyone who's interested in being a vendor at our Gifford Park Neighborhood Market, please send them our way. Our email—gpnmarket@gmail.com—is the best way to reach us.

Due to this new designation there comes some new requirements, our upcoming vendor meeting on Saturday, April 27, from 3–4 p.m. at Big Muddy's yellow house (3320 Burt Street) is especially important for all vendors to attend, whether you're new or experienced. We will have a presentation from a representative of the DCHD, which will explain what our official farmer's market status means for vendors, answer questions, and what things will have to be done for vendors to sell produce and food at the market this season.
