As part of our continual work to plant trees in our neighborhood and address food insecurity, Gifford Park will be partnering with the Big Garden to put a community orchard in along Cass street from 33rd to 30th this month. We will be replacing trees that did not survive from our May 2019 planting. We will be planting a mix of apples, asian pears, and other fruit trees that will beautify our streets and provide fresh fruit for all our neighbors. Big Muddy Urban Farm Update

Budding trees, budding seeds, and budding activities at Big Muddy Urban Farm. This past December, a group of five Aspiring Farmers moved into the Residency houses and we are ecstatic to introduce this year's crew! The group is composed of Sophia Cooper, Alexia Queen, Decker Woods, Madi White, and Henry Wisneski. As a part of the learning process, residents have come up with the name Earth and You to simulate the "start-up farm" experience and have developed a community supported agriculture program (CSA) with signups open now. Another budding activity we are excited about is the Youth Garden! After a year of limited interaction, we are excited to grow together again, with safety in mind. On March 27th, a planning meeting was held to discuss the youth garden program calendar and covid precautions. Thanks to Rose Carlson, Chris Foster, Frankie Hamburger, Matt Cronin, Monica Lehn, Cie Cie Miley, Brent Lubbert and Brittany Stebbins for brainstorming and BMUF Program Manager Rhonda Freeman for organizing and facilitating. An activity schedule with signup form will be distributed throughout the neighborhood in early May and signups will begin at the Open House of the Community Garden on Saturday May 15th (check with Chris and Brittany if there is an open house). We are following cdc guidelines, including wearing masks, to maintain a healthy and safe environment for youth gardeners and volunteers. And we're raising it up for raised beds! On Saturday, April 10 from 10am to Noon we are hosting a raised bed building workshop at the 3215 California st farm plot. Join in to get your hands dirty and build raised beds. It will also be a little bit of a celebration because the raised beds we are replacing lasted eight years! That's eight years of growing fresh veggies and training urban farmers right here in the neighborhood! After we refresh the raised beds, the next farm infrastructure improvement we are going to make is improvements to our three chicken coops. We're excited to grow in Gifford Park and look forward to seeing you around the neighborhood!

American Dream—coming through: Yates Illuminates opens Doors to the Future

We started 2021 on a roll! Our very first meeting of the New Year, on Monday, January 4, at 9 am -on zoom-- was on building the future of Yates Illuminates healthily, with and by the community. Getting to our office, we found the first signs of programming at Yates: the solar powered hydrogen fuel cell model car kits had been delivered and were waiting for us to organize the Science and Arts in Parks (at Yates) Youth Project. The next day we received the 6 feet by 3 feet polished aluminum sheets to become solar mirrors for powering solar Stirling co-generation engines for the same project (more details further in this article). Later that month, while walking in the neighborhood in the tall snow, we ran across the rest of the team, we learned about further architectural plans being drawn and contractors hired, and decided jointly to write a grant right away for tables and chairs





for meetings and other events at Yates, because what is a Community Center without chairs and tables if not just an empty building? It's done. While we wait for the answer, and the money, we'll use the model for writing a (much) bigger grant for many more tables and chairs and many other learning tools. There could not have been a more fitted start of this year of renewal. But let's recap briefly.

 A lot has happened since that Monday, November 16, 2020, when Omaha Public Schools



Board of Education voted to sell Yates back to the community. On Friday, December 18, 2020, the community finally—after two false alarms in prior days--took possession of the Yates building. It took a good few hours and a locksmith to resolve a missing key issue, but it all worked out in the end. Most of the committed anchor tenants were represented there to take part in the event, and they all got to give interviews on TV about their plans at Yates, and to enjoy fresh baked Belgian traditional cookies too. After all, we are always good hosts in Gifford Park; plus, Marie Hélène, the then President of the Gifford Park Neighborhood Association, is an accomplished amateur baker. What started at 9 am was eventually done by 4 pm.

Over a year of advocacy and volunteer work, of dreaming big and selling everyone on a bold

vision, of nurturing dreams, of building and growing partnerships, led to an open door. A door opened to the future for everyone. Let the future begin! We also spread the news around the country--in English and in French--thanks to host Franck Tucker Ebang and producer Pierre Sagitteh, MPA, from Kuanza Mpya African TV and to Omaha's community cable TV studio, KPAO: "Yates Illuminates gives people the American Dream. Not just to New Americans, but to everyone who wants to learn and apply to their life something new, at any age." (www.youtube.com/watch?v=xbj4AxxcTc8)

Over many meetings since January, GPNA neighborhood representatives and representatives from Metropolitan Community College, Learning for All, Refugee Empowerment Center, Benson Area Refugee Task Force, D2 Center, Great Plains Theatre Commons, Restoring Dignity, and quite a few other potential new tenants and partners took part in meetings via zoom, individually and jointly, and addressed spaces re-design, architectural plans, organizational plans and governance committees assignments, strategy ahead, and grant writing and fundraising priorities, to ensure a smooth opening and smooth operations and healthy seeds for future strategic growth.

We've collected and inventoried expressions of interest for using the community space for things from Yoga to new emerging youth STEM non-profits. We are planning to have Yates Illuminates open for the public as early as late April, but certainly no later than this Summer, as soon as the initial committed tenant organizations move in. What should you expect in the near future?

First, you are ALL invited to the Open House on Thursday, May 6, 2021, from 5:30 to 6:30 pm, to meet all anchor tenants, learn about future plans, ask questions and tour the building. It will be immediately followed by the Gifford Park Neighborhood Association General Meeting. See you soon at Yates Illuminates!

Later in the Summer and for the next three years, youth who will choose to participate in successive Science and Arts in Parks programs held in Gifford Park and at Yates will build and race solar powered hydrogen fuel cell model cars, will learn how to design and build a working model of the solar Stirling co-generation engines, out of the polished aluminum sheets GPNA bought with an Omaha Community Foundation grant, will build business plans and so much more.

These are just the first steps in this new and exciting adventure. We will keep you updated on the progress in our next newsletter. You are always welcome to contact us to share your ideas and suggestions.

Waste Bins

Now that we've had a little time to become accustomed to the new bins, perhaps helpful to go over a few of the new rules.

Generally speaking, all waste must go into the bins. FCC will not big up trash in bags, boxes, etc. Nor will they take trash leaning against the bins, or stacked on top of bins. In households with more than 5 members, free extra bins can be obtained. For smaller households, extra bins must be leased, for a fee.

There are a few exceptions. They will pick up yard waste in paper bags or bundled sticks. This waste will be picked up with the regular garbage, and sent to the landfill. But you must pay 2 dollars per bag or stick bundle. You can purchase stickers at Hy-Vee, Ace Hardware, and some other locations. Each bag or bundle must have a sticker, or they will not be picked up.

They also plan on picking up yard waste in bags for free for 6 weeks in the spring, and six weeks in the fall. This spring, the free period is May 17 through June 25. There is no limit on the number of bags, and the waste will be composted.

At other times of the year, you can put your yard waste in the black-topped garbage bins, so long as the lid can still close, and it will be taken for free.

Recycling is picked up every other week. The schedule can be found at https://wasteline.org/. Again, all materials must fit into the bin, with the lid closed. Materials piled around the bin, or stacked on top, will not be taken.

Glass is not to be included in the recycling. Glass and other recylables can be dropped of at one of the recycling sites listed on https://wasteline.org/recycling-collection-information/recycling-drop-off-locations/. The closest is at 17th and Burt.

Those finding the standard bin too large or difficult to handle can request a smaller bin. Obviously, you'll have less available space to fill. Special pickups can also be arranged for those disabled, or 70 and over. Those qualifying should call the solid waste help line at 402-444-5238 between 8am and 8pm weekdays to begin the process of registration.

Bins should be put out no later than 6:00AM on collection day. And should be taken in no later than 10:00am the following day. Bins should be placed near the curb, with some space between the recycling and waste carts if both are being picked up. City code does not permit leaving the cans on the curb permanently. Please cooperate by putting your cans out in a timely fashion, and taking them in after they are dumped.
