The Gifford Park Neighborhood Association (GPNA) has been working very hard to improve the appearance and safety of our neighborhood. The goal of the GPNA is to improve the neighborhood and make it a better place for all residents, and we would ask our new student neighbors to become a part of this effort.

The largest part of being a good neighbor is consideration for others. First, we ask students to be considerate in terms of noise, especially after 10 PM. Many families in our neighborhood have children or go to work early. Parties are another problem. Unfortunately, parties always seem to end up bigger and noisier than first planned.

Last newsletter I gave an update through week 9, here are highlights of the last six weeks of activities: Week 10 longtime Gifford Park resident and Boy Scout leader Bob Hutton (just turned 90!) taught us hands-on rope-making and had us use cranks to make rope from twine. Week 11 Big Muddy Urban Farm Fellow Tricey Chea led us in a sound bath meditation with sound bowls and listening to the sounds of nature around us. Week 12 culinary expert Witney Stanley and nutrition expert Frankie Hamburger taught us all about nutrition and great tips on cooking our vegetables...the meal was delicious! Week 13 local owner of 'Sovereign Beauty & Wellness' Arielle Martinez took us on a tour of the garden to find herbs and other healing plants, then we made our own infused honey. Week 14 Kelly Alsup from Big Muddy Urban Farm led us to explore our five senses and build poems using inspiration from the garden! Week 15 we celebrated another year of the Youth Garden with a Harvest Party!

We enjoyed homemade pizzas prepared by the kids, Big Muddy Urban Farm, and volunteers. Each pizza was topped with an assortment of vegetables harvested from our youth plots, Big Muddy's gardens, and Gifford Park Neighborhood Market. A HUGE thanks to youth garden director Monica Lehn, Big Muddy Urban Farm, and Mike Caban who greeted our young gardeners each week. This program teaches youth of all ages how to grow vegetables, prepare, eat, and share our harvest with others. Plus, the youth are creative with art and music; explore our natural environment; and have fun while working together and getting our hands dirty. GPYG relies upon parents and volunteers each week to provide snacks, lead lessons, and simply share their time. The Xerces Society for Invertebrate
Conservation is a nonprofit conservation
organization that protects the natural world
through the conservation of invertebrates and
their habitats. [The name of the organization
(which is pronounced Zer-sees) comes from
the now-extinct Xerces blue butterfly
(Glaucopsyche xerces), the first butterfly
known to go extinct in North America as a
result of human activities.] Insects and other
invertebrates—butterflies, dragonflies, beetles,
worms, bees, mussels, and crabs are but a few
—make up 94% of the world's animal species.





These animals pollinate plants, disperse seeds, are food for wildlife, recycle nutrients, clean water, control pest species, and more, services that are critical to life on our planet. Jennifer Hopwood, based in Omaha, is one of three Xerces staff that are based in Nebraska. Jennifer's work focuses on pollinators and also insects that contribute to soil health and biological control, and she works with scientists, land managers, educators, farmers, and communities to create habitat for these important animals. At the end of September we planted a variety of species in Gifford Parks on 33rd and Cass, the planted species are listed in the provided chart above. You can find out more at www.xerces.org.

Community Bike Project Hosted Bike Rodeo

It may be fall, and the peak of the cycling season is now behind us, but the Bike Project is as busy as ever at our shop on 33rd street. If you've popped in recently, you've no doubt seen Jacob or Jack hard at work with youth or adults as they work on their bikes. If you've never seen the shop, make sure to stop in and say hi.

The Bike Project is also excited to spread the word about a community event we hosted in Gifford Park earlier this month – a Bike Rodeo! A Bike Rodeo is a youth-centered bike safety event. We set up various stations where our staff and volunteers taught children various bike safety skills by using simulated real-life situations. Children had their bicycles and helmets inspected and fitted, then rode through a skills course to learn bike safety techniques. The goal was to learn safe cycling skills while also having fun!





We had a free helmet for any youth who attended (ages 5-12). They were also entered into a raffle for a free bike that Jacob built. We had a mechanic station available to service issues.

The Science, Engineering and Teamwork camp is for youth 7 to 16 to learn about Science and Engineering while having fun, playing and interacting with others.

During the Summer, youth 7 to 16 learned about the energy of the future, physics and the mechanical advantage, and robotics. During the first session, they built and raced solar powered fuel cell model cars and built electric circuits. The second and third sessions were dedicated to mouse-trap powered cars: participants designed, built and raced their own mouse-trap cars. Finally, the last session was dedicated to building and using functional Lego-like machines.

More sessions will be offered in the Spring of 2023. Stay tuned!

Neighbors Save Yates and Now The Yates Fund Hires its First Executive Director, Marie Hélène André

The Yates Fund, which operates Yates Illuminates LLC, has hired Marie Hélène André as its first Executive Director. Neighbors from the Gifford Park Neighborhood united together in 2019 to save the former Yates Elementary School at 3260 Davenport Street. The Save Yates for Omaha group led community fundraising efforts, and received a matching grant from the Sherwood Foundation and essential support from the Weitz Family Foundation to secure the purchase of the former school building from the Omaha Public Schools Board of Education in November of 2020.

A new era begins for Yates Illuminates with the formal hiring of Marie Hélène André as Executive Director. Born in Burundi, raised in Rwanda, and of Belgian descent, Marie Hélène officially became an American citizen on November 17, 2015. She is multilingual and has earned two MA's, one in English and Dutch as foreign languages, and one in European Studies. After arriving in the United States, she also earned an MBA from Bellevue University.

Marie Hélène's career has focused on education. She has taught language (English, French, Dutch) to both children and adults, and has held positions in the European Commission and Metropolitan Community College, both of which focused on educational workshops and language classes. Marie Hélène has also worked in administration. Her background in both education and administration, as well as her New American status, makes her perfectly suited to be the Executive Director of a community center dedicated to serving a community with a diverse immigrant/refugee population.

Yates Illuminates will be home to an array of local non-profit tenants, including Metropolitan Community College, Restoring Dignity, D2 Center, Great Plains Theater Commons, Bluebird Cultural Initiative, Youth for Greater Good, Do Space, International Council of Refugees and Immigrants, Inc, Midlands African Chamber, Inc., Lending Link, Intercultural Senior Center, Families In Action, Refugee Women Rising, and Gifford Park Neighborhood Association.

Marie Hélène is committed to the mission of Yates Illuminates, which is "to serve our community by offering social, cultural, and educational resources in order to create an inclusive environment that uplifts every person's possibilities." Marie Hélène André officially started her new job as Executive Director of Yates Illuminates on September 26. ONE

GPNA will only print letters that address a specific issue, theme, or article



TWO

Letters may not be more than a single page of the newsletter. The letter can be words, pictures, or other images.



THREE

GPNA will not print more than one letter per issue per writer



FOUR

To preserve the author's intent letters do not need to be edited for style, clarity, or grammar. The NRC may suggest edits to the author to provide clairty to readers

FIVE



Letters do not need to be in any particular language. The NRC will work with the author and others to translate the letter to English. Both versions of the letter will be printed.

GPNA WILL NOT PRINT

Guidelines for letters to the editor continued

ONE

Letters that incite physical violence.

Letters that are obscene. This includes any statement that is vulgar, profane, or offensive.

TWO

Letters that are threatening. This includes personal attacks, intimidation, bullying or threat of harm against a person or organization.

THREE

Letters making false statements of fact about other people. These letters are potentially libelous. You can disagree with someone, but you cannot claim they did something damaging without proof.

FOUR

Discriminatory on any grounds. This includes discrimination based on age, ability, gender, sexual orientation, religion or culture.

FIVE

Letters that are promoting products or services. Letters may discuss resources if they are neighborhood specific, or if it refers to another newsletter article. The newsletter provides other routes for advertising.

SIX

Letters that discuss any candidate for political office. This is because the GPNA is a 501(c)3
